OPERA IN GERMANY.

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# Opera is serious business in Germany, At all of the capitals it is supported by the governments, under the direction of the minister of education or some other official, who looks after it as closely as he looks after the hospitals or the schools. It is considered a necessary feature of German education, and although the public are required to pay a reasonable price for admission tick ets, it is much smaller than is charged anywhere in the United States and is usually less than the admission price to ordinary theaters. A certain standard of excellence is required, and the deficit in the receipts is always made up from the treasury of the state or he municipality. Usually the price of admision varies from 25 cents to \$1, acording to the location of the seats. with a little extra for Wagner operas because it costs so much more to pro-duce them. In Berlin the charges are igher than anywhere else in Germany from 37 cents to \$3-according to loation, for which you get from four to even hours. The best opera is in Dre

People do not dress for the opera here as in other countries. You see no ladies with low-neck dresses, and very few entiemen with evening suits. Nor is it customary to applaud except when the performance has been unusually brilliant, and even then, under the most sensational circumstances, all marks of approval must be reserved until the end of the act. No encores are permitted, because they destroy the dramatic uni-ty. Not a note is cut out of the score, which is given entire on all occasions. The performance often begins as early o'clock and sometimes lasts for five and six hours. People eat an ear-ly dinner before they go, have a glass of beer and a sandwich after each act. and supper when they return to the homes. Berlin fashionable society ha
