THE RICKLE TROUBLE IS NARROWED.

Data County Items—Crops in Baled Valley—Terror from a Horse.

The newspaper men of Nevada met at the Reno Gazette office Wednesday morning and effected the organization of a state press association.

S. B. Hunt, of Forest Grove, O., has acquired new, a half-ton of prime mutton, out of about a half score, and can hardly be missed. It is estimated the one and one-half acres have twenty-two tons.

There has an impression got out that the hay crop in Black Valley is a mere failure this year and a large number of men come into the valley to seek and winter their stock looking elsewhere for wintering quarters, says the "Mesa Enterprise." How such an impression could get started is not known, but it can tell because every body knows that the grain and hay crop has been larger than it ever was before. It is safe to say that the grain crop in particular never was equalled in any one season.
