Diamond Drills to be Used in Prospecting Rush Group. Special Correspondence.

Special Correspondence. Bullfrog. Nev., April 10.—Governor Sparks of Nevada, John S. Cook, the Goldfield banker. Thos Robinson, direc-tor of the Jumbo Mining Co. of Gold-field, and L. M. Sullivan, head of the L. M. Sullivan Trust company of Gold. field, figure in the deal by which the famous Rush group of claims on Bonanza Mountain have been pur-chased from Dr. J. Grant Lyman, of New York, for half a million dollars. The sale is looked upon here as an or-dinary transaction, as mining deals go

The sale is looked upon here as an or-dinary transaction, as mining deals go now-a days although half a year ago, before Chas. M. Schwab and other eastern capitalists came into the dis-trict, the community would have been enthused to the boiling point. The sale assures a clean profit of over \$300,000 to Dr. Lyman, who bonded the property for \$150,000 less than six months ago. Dr. Lyman has been developing the property on his own account for several property on his own account for several months, and it has proven to be a great gold mine.

Development work on the Rush has been prosecuted on broaded lines, and with the air of a larger force of men than has ever been employed in the opening up of any other Bullfrog prop-erty. No less than eight tunnels have been driven into the property, and the work is being carried on with a swing and detail heretofore unknown in Ne-vada mining. The tunnels are so ar-ranged that they can all be connected with one shaft and the ore taken out with the greatest facility. The main with the greatest facility. The main tunnel on the Rush claim is in 175 feet and the face is now about 50 feet from the Rush vein, which it will cut at a vertical depth of 250 feet. The Rush vein is 154 feet wide, earrying from 34 to 340 a ton in gold values, and every foot of it is milling ore, with more than 100 000 tons exposed 100,000 tons exposed.

100,000 tons exposed. A diamond drill has been ordered and will be placed in the main tunnel, where it will cut all the known veins of Bomanza Mountain, with a certainty, from surface indications, of discover-ing new veins. It is the intention to run a tunnel completely through the mountain, which will be 3,800 feet long and give a perpendicular depth of about 1,200 feet. Bunk houses and boarding houses have been second. 1,200 feet. Bunk houses and boarding houses have been erected, and four miles of road has been built to connect the different workings on the mountain, Forty men are employed, working three shifts a day.
