

## Special Prayers for the Episcopalians.

Bishop Odenheimer, of New Jersey, has issued a pastoral letter to the Clergy and Laity of his Diocese, authorizing the use of the following prayer during the continuance of the existing national troubles:

Oh, most powerful and glorious Lord God, the Lord of hosts, that rulest and commandest all things; Thou sittest on the Throne, judging right; and, therefore, we make our address to Thy Divine Majesty, in this our necessity, that Thou wouldst take the cause of our country in thine own hand.

Thou alone makest man to be of one mind in an house, and pourest into their hearts the most excellent gift of charity. Appease, we beseech Thee, the tumults which exist among us. Give peace in our times, O Lord; and grant to all of us, grace, that we may henceforth obediently walk in Thy holy commandments; and leading a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty, may continually offer unto Thee our sacrifice of praise and thanks-giving for these thy mercies towards us, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Bishop Brownell, of Connecticut, has directed the following to be used in his Diocese so long as it may be deemed expedient on occasions of divine service:

O most powerful and glorious Lord God, the Lord of Hosts, that rulest and commandest all things; Thou sittest on the throne, judging right, and therefore we make our address to Thy Divine Majesty in this our necessity, that thou wouldst take the cause of our afflicted country in thine own hand. Stir up thy strength O Lord and come and help us; let not our sins now cry against us for vengeance; still the outrage of the violent and unruly; appease the tumults raised up amongst us; restore to us the blessings of peace; and make it appear that thou art our Savior and mighty deliverer, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

## Another Prayer for the Times.

The following prayer, previously arranged by the proper church dignitary, was read in all the Episcopal churches in California, on the first Sunday in May:

O God, our Heavenly Father, in the midst of manifold and sore troubles, which our transgressions have brought upon us, we come to Thee as our only refuge. We acknowledge and bewail our many sins, which have most justly provoked Thy wrath and indignation. Spare us who now confess our transgressions unto Thee. Mercifully behold us, now humbling ourselves under Thy mighty hand, in this day of confusion and trouble.

Thou alone makest men to be of one mind, and stillest the outrage of violence and disorder. Take away, we beseech Thee, all hatred and prejudice from among us, and whatever may hinder the return of peace and concord. Appease the strife and tumults which have arisen, that they bring not upon us more and more, the sins of blood guiltiness. Restore peace in our time, O Lord, and so turn Thine anger from us, truly repenting of our sins, that being restored to Godly quietness here, we may again be all of one heart and one spirit, united in one holy bond of faith and charity, and may with one mind and one mouth glorify Thee, through Jesus Christ, our Lord, Amen.

## Population of the Earth.

The Directors of the Statistical Bureau of Berlin furnishes the following curious statement.

The population of the whole earth is estimated to be 1,288,000,000, viz: Europe, 272,000,000; Asia, 755,000,000; Africa, 200,000,000; America, 50,000,000; and Austria, 2,000,000. The population of Europe is thus subdivided: Russia contains 62,000,000, the Austrian States, 36,298,620; France, 36,039,364; Great Britain and Ireland, 27,488,853; Prussia, 17,089,407; Turkey, 18,740,000; Spain, 17,518,000; the Two Sicilies, 8,616,922; Sweden and Norway, 5,072,082; Sardinia, 4,976,034; Belgium, 4,607,066; Bavaria, 4,548,239; the Netherlands, 3,486,017; Portugal, 3,471,199; the Papal States, 3,000,000; Switzerland, 2,494,500; Denmark, 2,468,648.

In Asia, the Chinese Empire contains 400,000,000; the East Indies, 171,000,000; the Indian Archipelago, 80,000,000; Japan, 35,000,000. Hindostan and Asiatic Turkey, each 15,000,000.

In America, the United States are computed to contain 23,191,875; Brazil, 7,677,800; Mexico, 7,661,520.

In the several nations of the earth there are 335,000,000 of Christians, of whom 180,000,000 are Catholics, 80,000,000 Protestants, and 76,000,000 followers of the Greek Church. The number of Jews amounts to 5,000,000; of these 2,890,750 are in Europe, viz: 1,250,000 in European Russia; 853,304 in Austria, 234,248 in Prussia; 192,107 in other parts of Germany; 62,470 in the Netherlands; 33,953 in Italy; 73,995 in France; 36,000 in Great Britain; 7,000 in Turkey. The followers of various Asiatic religions are estimated at 600,000,000; Mahomedans at 160,000,000, and "Heathens" (the Gentiles proper) at 200,000,000.

—Jeff. Davis graduated at West Point in the class of 1828. He ranked 23d, in a class numbering 33.

## CLIPPINGS.

—It is reported that the ladies of Georgetown, Pa., made a splendid flag, set to work on soldier's clothes, and informed the young men that those who didn't enlist, had better don gowns, keep house, do the washing, and look after the babies.

—Governor Morgan of New York recently received the following note from a brave but illiterate Knickerbocker:

"Sir, please will you give me a pass to go to war or to any town to fite, for i can fite very good, i was fighting with indians at far west last 2 years when I was travelling to pikes peak, i am well known how to shoot by Minie Guns & revolvers & i am very brave, i will be a good warrior, i want to die for the star banner & for the constitution of the u. s. of America. If you want, i will kill the rebell Jefferson davis or Beaugards or i will bring his head to you. i give you my word that i am true."

—It is said that all the printers in Cambridge city, Indiana, have volunteered, for the war and no paper will be published there for some time to come.

—The Washington Star says that first and last, fifty thousand dollars have been sunk in the now defunct States newspaper. Judge Douglas is believed to have been pretty freely bled by it.

—The great fortune of the Winans was amassed by some lucky contracts for rolling stock with the Russian Government, 20 years ago, for the St. Petersburg and Moscow railroad. They are now worth nearly \$10,000,000, and their factories in Baltimore were at work night and day, till recently, turning out cannon and shot for the south.

—Rev. Mr. Wise (a son of ex-Gov Wise of Va.), who is stationed over a church in West Philadelphia, stepped into a barber's recently to get shaved. While the process was advancing he said "one Virginian is worth three Northerners," and hoped the latter would be whipped. At this the barber took offence, and instantly ejected the reverend gentleman into the street half-shaved—one-half of his face yet lathered, and he in his shirt sleeves. A member of his church passing by, got a carriage and took him home, and begged him to keep still. He did not preach the next day, and during the night was packed off.

—An immense Union meeting was held a few weeks since, at the Chicago Wigwam. The number in attendance is variously estimated at from thirty to fifty thousand persons. During the proceedings, at the suggestion of Judge Manniere, the whole audience raised their right hands, and took the oath of allegiance to the Union, repeating the oath after the Judge. That was certainly swearing by wholesale.

—An exchange says, a typographical fighter has screwed his courage up to the stick-ing point, and enlisted in the Warren Artillery, Fall River, Mass., which was soon to leave for the seat of conflict. Armed with the shooting-stick and the f, he would press his way through the rebellious hosts to Washington, unless the chivalry should unlock his form and knock him into "pi," in which case he declared the bed of glory preferable to a "sit." From his well known bravery, and it was believed he would give the enemy an abundance of leaded matter.
