

## PREMIER DELYANNIS IS ASSASSINATED

Stabbed at the Main Entrance to  
The Chamber of Deputies  
in Athens.

## WAS THE WORK OF A GAMBLER.

Said He Did It in Revenge for String-  
ent Measures Taken Against  
Gambling Houses.

Athens, June 12.—Theodore P. Delyannis, the popular premier of Greece, was stabbed and mortally wounded by a professional gambler named Gherakaris, at the main entrance of the chamber of deputies, at 5 p. m. today. The premier died within three hours. The assassin, who was immediately arrested, said he committed the deed in revenge for the stringent measures taken by Premier Delyannis against the gambling houses, all of which recently were closed.

The premier arrived at the entrance of the chamber in a carriage. Gherakaris approached, saluted the premier and opened the carriage door. The premier was in the act of thanking Gherakaris for his courtesy when the gambler plunged a long dagger into M. Delyannis' abdomen, inflicting a frightful wound.

The murder was immediately overpowered by the attendants. Medical assistance was immediately summoned and the wounded man was taken to a Red Cross station, where an operation was performed in an effort to stop the internal hemorrhage. This was unsuccessful, and Premier Delyannis died at 7 o'clock.

The news spread quickly, and it would be impossible to describe the popular evidences of sorrow or the anger of the crowd, who attempted to lynch the assassin. Lynching was prevented by the gendarmes, who rushed their prisoner from a building to prison.

It is estimated that 25,000 persons witnessed the removal of the body of the premier from the Red Cross station to his late residence. Members of the cabinet and the chamber of deputies were among the crowd, many of them weeping.

The cabinet met this evening at the residence of the premier of the chamber, and it was decided that the body should lie in state in the chamber before internment.

King George, who is at Taos, announced that he would at once return to Athens.

Investigation by the police shows that Gherakaris was recently liberated from prison, having been sentenced to 18 years for the murder of his wife.

It has been reported here for some time that France contemplated further defense along the coast line of her eastern provinces, and news was recently received that the plans of the French admiralty for these fortifications were becoming more definite. It is now known that the French admiralty has since the signing of the treaty of Japan in the present war.

At the navy department the news of the French intentions in regard to the coast line of the Philippines, a condition to which Admiral Dewey has frequently called attention, and the hope was expressed that the action of the German government would result in action by Congress to meet the needs of the American naval base at Olongapo, plans for the defense of which were prepared long ago by the general board of the navy, of which Admiral Dewey is president.

## IMMIGRATION TO URUGUAY.

Many Farmers from Missouri  
and Colorado Are Going There.

New York, June 14.—The colonization office has reported that a large number of farmers from Missouri and Colorado have resolved to emigrate to Uruguay, and requested information about the fiscal laws.

The report says it is necessary to ascertain the probable number of emigrants, their financial condition and details before the government can give an opinion.

## KILLED THE TRAMP.

He First Tried to Kill a Train  
Conductor.

Great Falls, Mont., June 13.—A special from Havre to the Tribune says: The city marshal of Williston, N. D., today shot and killed an unidentified tramp in a general revolver battle in Williston. The tramp had endeavored to kill Conductor J. E. Salisbury of the city, firing at him twice up the line. He was kept in a box car and finally locked in by aid of the brakemen. Officials in Williston were notified and when the train arrived there on hand. When the marshal opened the car door the prisoner opened fire and endeavored to escape. A bullet stopped his flight and early arrest.

## New German Torpedoboats.

Berlin, June 13.—The navy department has ordered from the Germania works six sea-going torpedoboats of a different type from those previously constructed or ordered by the navy. The boats on the government list as "G-132" to "G-137." The Cologne Gazette says they are of large displacement and are in every way stronger built and fitted with more numerous torpedo tubes than the torpedoboats previously laid down. The main parts of the new boats will be protected from the fire of the smaller guns of warships. Those boats, which are to be completed inside of a year, are expected to have a speed equal to the boats of the present type, owing to their powerful machinery, and yet be strong enough to withstand the fire of an enemy's quick-firing guns while approaching a warship and discharging torpedoes. One of the six boats will be armed with turbine engines and an experimental.

## Arrested for Counterfeiting.

Los Angeles, June 13.—United States Marshal officers today arrested in this city Henry Burnett Duncan, who is wanted in Paducah, Ky., for counterfeiting. Duncan admits his identity. He fled from Kentucky while under bond to stand trial for counterfeiting in April, 1904, and the United States officers have since been constantly on the search for him.

## GERMANY AROUSES NAVY DEPARTMENT

Her Proposed Fortification of  
Kiaochow Draws Attention to  
Philippines.

## ARE ABSOLUTELY UNFORTIFIED.

Hoped Congress Will Recognize Their  
Defenseless Condition and  
Do Something.

Washington, June 13.—Berlin advices announcing that extensive fortifications are to be erected in Kiaochow bay have aroused considerable interest here, and in diplomatic circles have led to speculation about Germany's intentions. In a conversation tonight on this subject Baron Speck von Sternburg, the German ambassador, said:

"Plans for the defense of Kiaochow harbor, which is Germany's naval base in the far east, were drawn up some time ago, in accordance with Germany's agreement with China, which provided for the fortifying of the harbor. Lack of funds, however, has made impossible the execution of the project until now, owing to the great amount of money necessary to cover the cost of erecting docks, piers and other landing facilities for trading vessels and junks. Having provided excellent facilities for ships of commerce, attention apparently has now been turned to the fortifications. It is possible that certain changes will be made in the plans, but my idea is that the work will be along the line of the original project."

"The announcement now that the work is to be done shows that the necessary funds have at last been obtained. The appropriation will be used in the construction of forts and their equipment with modern ordnance. I should say the defenses would be of the same general character as those at Hongkong or the American naval base at Guantanamo. It is, of course, realized that a naval base not defended is almost a handicap, and what-ever plans for the work have been approved in Berlin are in accordance with our agreement with China."

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## A REMARKABLE CASE.

For Years Thomas F. Wyckes Has  
Lived a Dual Life.

New York, June 13.—A remarkable case of alleged dual identity came to light today with the arrest and indictment by the grand jury of Thomas F. Wyckes, a prominent lawyer, on a charge of blackmail. According to Dist. Atty. Jerome, Wyckes has been living a Jekyll and Hyde life for more than three years. His relative claim that he had shown evidence of dual identity, and that he was mentally unbalanced, and that he had thought of sending him to a retreat, but that he informed them that he would not consent to any such attempt.

When he was arrested today Wyckes was released on \$10,000 bail, pleading on the indictment being deferred until next Monday on request of his defense attorney. The case is based on a complaint made by Edward Weston, head of the Weston Electrical Instrument company of New York, N. Y., who alleges that Wyckes under the fictitious name wrote him annoying letters criticizing acts of an attorney employed by Mr. Weston in a case in which Wyckes also was interested, and demanding money.

Wyckes is well known as a civil lawyer and has a handsome residence in West Seventy-third street. He is about 55 years old. He was graduated at Yale in 1874 and from the Columbia law school in 1876. He is a member of many clubs and was assistant corporation counsel of this city when U. S. Judge Lacombe was corporation counsel.

## Policeman's Home Dynamited.

Everett, Wash., June 13.—The home of J. C. Williams, a policeman, 3202 Maple street, was dynamited early this morning. No one was injured. Spite and neighborhood difficulties are supposed to be the motive for the crime. G. F. Ryan has been arrested. Chief of Police Dwyer will not disclose the nature of evidence against him. The dynamite was placed at a side door at the end of a long porch. The explosion damaged a portion of the porch, shattering it to bits, broke several windows and shattered the wall against which the bombs had been placed. The house was otherwise damaged.

## Thos. D. Satterwhite Suicides.

Tucson, Ariz., June 13.—Thomas D. Satterwhite, former attorney-general of Arizona, committed suicide by hanging himself today by shooting. During the past year he has been suffering with nervous prostration, partly brought on by losses sustained in mining operations.

## KING OSCAR WRITES A LETTER

Is to President of Norwegian  
Storting Defining and De-  
fending His Position.

## DID NOT OVERSTEP HIS RIGHTS.

He Gives no Intimation that Force  
Will Be Resorted to to Restore  
The Union.

Stockholm, Sweden, June 13.—King Oscar, in a long and vigorously-worded letter to the president of the Norwegian storting, M. Berner, declares that the accession oath of Norway's king makes it the king's duty not to pass over in silence the preference of the Norwegian council of state on the occasion of his majesty's visit of the consular bill. The king maintains that he did not overstep his prerogatives under the constitution, and says that consideration for the union imposes on the king the duty of exercising his constitutional rights.

"The king of Norway," he adds, "must always bear in mind and guard with 1 of the Norwegian constitution, which reads:

"The kingdom of Norway is free, autonomous, independent and indivisible."

"I feel myself justified in demanding respect for the decision taken by the king of Norway in accordance with the constitution. The powers which the constitution places at the disposal of the Norwegian king in order to enable him to promote the welfare of the country according to his convictions are no greater than those which must be reserved to the monarchy united with Sweden under one king."

After lengthily repudiating the declaration of the council of state that his veto was unconstitutional because no member of the council regarded himself as being in a position to counteract it, King Oscar proceeds:

"One of the fundamental principles of the constitution, and a fact that is most important, is that Norway shall be a constitutional monarchy. It is clearly incompatible therewith that the king sink to the position of a mere tool in the hands of the state council. If the members of the council of state, by refusing to counteract any of the royal decisions, could prevent them from having force, the king of Norway would be excluded from participation in the state administration. Such a situation would be as degrading to the monarchy as harmful to Norway. The position of the king as monarch of the united kingdom of Sweden and Norway makes it incumbent upon him not to prejudice as monarch of one kingdom questions affecting the other kingdom."

"The duty of the king on this point cannot be reconciled with the view that one kingdom, through the refusal of its council of state to append a counter signature, can annul the royal judgment, wherein the king refuses to give a decision prejudicial to the other kingdom, and injurious to the union."

"The Norwegian people and the Norwegian nation demand the right to force the king to give a decision which in his opinion conflicts with his duty as monarch of the united kingdoms and king of Sweden, therefore, the king of Sweden must become altogether dependent, as regards his decisions, upon the will of the Norwegian nation through its council of state."

"Such a position for the kingly power I can only describe as being irreconcilable with the laws that govern the down in the kingdom, the charter promulgated in 1815 and being now fundamental laws in the terms of the two united kingdoms, and therefore, the king of Sweden must become altogether dependent, as regards his decisions, upon the will of the Norwegian nation through its council of state."

"My endeavor has always been to give Norway that place within the union to which she can rightly lay claim. My royal duty to the union requires me to endeavor to uphold its legal basis, even when by so doing I come into opposition with the Norwegian national feeling."

"The law on which I took the oath, and which has regard for the welfare of the united kingdoms, determined my decision on the consular question, but here I was not only bound to uphold the law, but I was bound to uphold the law of the Norwegian council of state to counteract that decision, but by the resignation of its members. When I declined to accept the resignation of the council, it declared threateningly that any Norwegian who co-operated in carrying out my decision would at the same moment be without a fatherland. I was, therefore, placed in the position of either myself breaking the oath, which I would never do, or of reconciling myself to stand with-out council officers."

"The council, after attempting to violate the constitution, and to render void a decision of the king of Norway legally given, resigned office and the king of Norway was deprived of councilors. The storting, in breach of the constitution and by a revolutionary proceeding declared that the legitimate king of Norway had ceased to reign, and that the union of the two kingdoms was dissolved."

"It remains for Sweden, and for me, as king of the union, to decide whether the attack by Norway on the existing union shall lead to the legal dissolution of that union."

"Let the present generation and posterity judge between me and the Norwegian people."

## PLEADED GUILTY.

Wheaton, Minn., Business Men  
Conspired to Defraud Gov't.

Seattle, Wash., June 13.—F. M. Barrett and W. W. House, wealthy business men of Wheaton, Minn., yesterday pleaded guilty in the federal court to complicity in a conspiracy to defraud the government by inducing Italians to take out timber claims near Kalispell, Mont., and were sentenced to one year in the United States penitentiary and the payment of a fine of \$5,000 and the cost of the action. Judge Hanford made caustic remarks on the moral turpitude which was involved and which was condoned by a letter introduced by defendant Barrett from a cousin who is a judge of the supreme court of Maine. H. J. Shout and G. L. Brokaw, who are also defendants, refused to plead. The case against Shout may be dismissed. After sentence was passed the prisoners were taken into custody and placed in the county jail.

## England Declines Austria Accepts

London, June 13.—Great Britain, as one of the powers signatory to the Madrid convention of 1880, in answer to the request of the sultan of Morocco to join an intervention on the conference for the consideration of the Moroccan question has announced that its preference is not to take any part in the conference unless such action would be satisfactory to France.

## The United States Has Taken the

stand, the two powers being in accordance with the view that a conference would not be the best way of promoting urgent reforms in Morocco.

The Tangier correspondent of the Times says that the Austrian government has accepted the invitation of the sultan of Morocco to an international conference, conditional on a similar acceptance by other powers.
