For Years Thes. F. Wyckes Has Lived a Dual Life.

CORPORAL PUNISHMENT.

Restored in New York Public

Schools by Court's Decision. New York, June 14 .- Corporal punishment, abolished some time ago by the board of education, has been re-stored in New York public schools, through a decision of Judge Oimstead. in the children's court, although the president of the board enters a con

According to the judge the lash may now be used by teachers without any interference on the part of the parents whenever the court gives juvenile of-

whenever the court gives juvenile of-fenders into their custody. This decision was reached after ex-amining two boys, the first for play-ing truant, the second on a charge of stealing a gold ring from his teacher. Both pleaded guilty. Their parents pleaded hard with the judge not to send the boys to an insti-tution. Judge Olmstead then announced his decision to act under a new form

his decision to act under a new for of commitment, by which children gui of commitment, by which children guil-ty of small crimes can be punished under the legal guardianship of their teachers. This means corporal pun-ishment whenever the guardian feels like wielding the rod or the strap, for he has the same authority to punish under the law as the parents. President Tifft of the board of edu-cation, declared the court's decision to be in direct opposition to the rules which govern the management of the public schools and that he did not be-



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
