

## HISGEN ATTACKS TWO OLD PARTIES

Independence Candidate for President Enthusiastically Received at Salt Palace.

RESPECTS TO STANDARD OIL

Says W. R. Hearst is Responsible for Placing Foraker, Haskell and Dupont on List of "Down and Out."

Despite the "American" party convention and other attractions last night, Thomas L. Hisgen, the Independence party candidate for president of the United States received an enthusiastic reception at the Salt Palace on the occasion of his appearance there to expound the principles of the Independence party. The auditorium was well filled with interested spectators who gave their undivided attention to the distinguished speaker.

In his speech Mr. Hisgen did not spare the two big parties but went after them with a vengeance and also vigorously attacked the Standard Oil company. The gentleman has an attractive appearance and a splendid voice which rang with sincerity when he hurled his charges against the Republican and Democratic parties and against the trusts. He paid some attention to Senator Foraker, Dupont and Gov. Haskell and declared that Hearst was responsible for their "place in the down and out club."

The Hisgen party arrived in Salt Lake at 6:20 last evening and registered at the Wilson. They received a warm welcome at the hotel and a warmer one at the Salt Palace. The party came here from Kansas City but the long ride did not seem to have any serious effect on any of the party. The visitors are: Thomas L. Hisgen, Independence party candidate for president; George C. Hisgen, brother of the candidate; J. R. Buchanan, C. L. Pollock, F. R. E. Woodward.

As before stated the visitors were well received at the Salt Palace and the speeches of Mr. Hisgen and Mr. Buchanan were received with considerable applause. The greeting given to Mr. Hisgen when he stepped upon the platform at 8:30 amounted to an ovation.

The visitor said in part:

MR. HISGEN'S SPEECH.

"I am not a public speaker and make no pretense of being an orator. I always try to take my audience into my confidence at the start, and that is why I am starting out by telling you the absolute truth. I am doing what I can in a plain and thoroughly sincere way to advocate the principles which constitute the platform of the Independence party."

"Mr. John Temple Graves, the candidate of the Independence party for vice president, who will speak here on next Friday night, is a much abler orator and will clearly elucidate our party principles."

"My friends, the two old political parties are abroad in the land asking you for your votes. Mr. Taft and his cohorts are singing the glories of the grand old Republican party—the party of the trusts and corporations and the party which believes implicitly that you can fool enough of the people all the time to keep it in power."

"This is the party that made the trusts through unjust tax discrimination, bank discrimination and railroad discrimination. This is the party that goes to the same place for its patriotic inspiration that it goes for its campaign contributions—Wall street. This is the party that has made possible the Standard Oil trust, which I have grown gray in fighting."

"If any man in this country should have reason to feel that he has any political party, I should feel that way regarding the party that helped Rockefeller pile up his millions and allowed his henchmen to place laws on the statute books that helped him to crush out competition. But there is one thing I admire about this party—it acknowledges to be the party of the trusts and corporations and the party of the rich men. It is not hypocritical in that particular."

"All this talk about Taft destroying the trusts is a bold and bald-faced lie. The wildest character he would be a more ungrateful man than I think he is to put an end to the power that made him he would have to be more heartless than he has ever shown himself to be. If he were to end the life of the party through which he has gained all of his eminence, because Taft owes all that he is and has ever been to his party and not to the people, and Taft is no fool. He knows that without the campaign contributions of the corporations the grand old party would melt away like a crystal of snow before the blaze of the morning sun."

Mr. Buchanan of New York, preceded Mr. Hisgen, made an earnest appeal to the voters to support the Independence movement. He said in part:

"The Independence of American citizens has asserted itself and decided that the time is ripe to overthrow both of the old parties. It has decided that the rule of the people shall be restored to the people. It has decided that the death-knell of the trust-dominated, boss-ridden parties must be sounded."

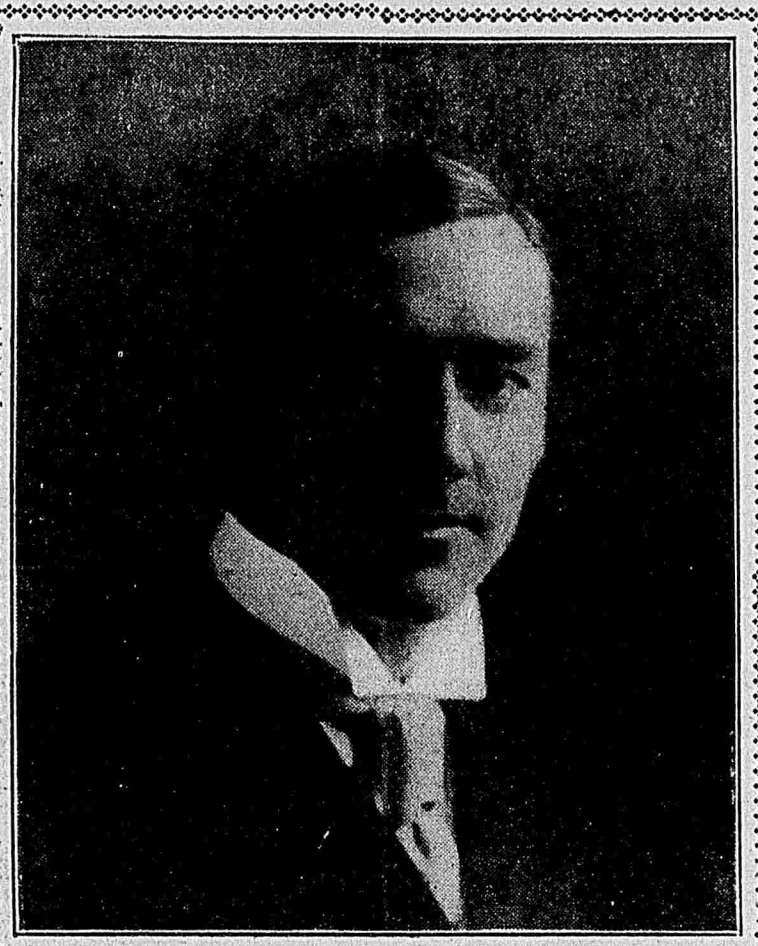
"We do not believe that there is any need to arouse the people to the existing conditions in the two big parties. We think that they are convinced. We

believe that they have decided that the old parties have outlived their usefulness and that their only hope and salvation is in the new and vigorous Independence party.

"The platform of the Independence party is clear and concise. It gives the voters the opportunity to vote for what they want, for what the common people have been clamoring for years for. It gives the opportunity to overthrow the parties which, through their corruption, favoritism and party bosses, have made a sham of their announced principles."

"We believe in the direct election of United States senators by the popular vote of the people. The United States senate is not a representative body of the people and it has not been for years. Public service corporations have always elected the senators. I do not know the senators from Utah, but I'll wager that they are not the representatives of the plain people."

After the meeting Mr. Hisgen held a public reception and shook hands with scores of people. The party left this morning for Denver over the Colorado Midland. Mr. Hisgen speaks in Denver on Wednesday.

"Taft is the candidate of the party of the trust and of special privilege, and if you believe in that sort of thing vote for him. But there are many men who do not believe that the great mass of people who helped to make this country what it is today should have a square deal and an honest equal opportunity to make a living. If you believe that you do not want to be fooled by the waving of the starchy flag from the platform of the Republican campaigners and the declaration that this is the only party that can save the country. A few more victories by this party such as we are now passing through will place this country beyond saving."

AGAINST STANDARD OIL.

"I have heretofore voted the Democratic ticket—that is, I generally tried to find out what side the Standard Oil company was on and then I voted the other way. But of late years this gigantic company has been on both sides. It stood to win whichever came out ahead. And the people stood to lose whichever came out ahead."

"I voted for Bryan twice. But I'm not going to vote for him a third time. I'm not even going to bring up my children to vote for him, as they will probably have an opportunity to do. They declare that this is not the same old Bryan—that there is a new Bryan in the field and the trust-owned newspapers shriek with delight at the charge."

"They are right it is not the same Bryan. He used to spurn such men as Roger Sullivan and Tom Taggart and Charlie Murphy and he held up to scorn the money magnates, such as Ryan and Belmont and Whitney. But he is a changed Bryan now, and instead of the men whom he denounced coming over to him he has gone over to them."

"Young, honest, sincere and with that glow of patriotism in his heart that called forth the ridicule of the men who are in politics for their own pockets, Bryan advocated principles that if made into law would help humanity. But he has looked upon the wine of office when it was red, and becoming intoxicated with desire and ambition, he has flung away the darling dreams of his unpolished youth and now stands for just such things as the corporation element of his party will stand for. Yes, it is a new Bryan who asks for your votes, and it is

against which the United States government now has a suit pending.

"That is an admirable state of circumstances, citizens, for the G. O. P. to have a millionaire trust man, a man whom the government is prosecuting for alleged law-breaking in charge of the speakers who are trying to hide the glaring faults of the Republican party by throwing dust in the people's eyes. Mr. Du Pont has gone over the same road with Mr. Foraker. He is also eligible."

"We haven't spared the Democratic party. We showed that Mr. Haskell, governor of Oklahoma, was the paymaster of the Standard Oil trust. His trust connections secured him the position of campaign treasurer of the Democratic party. He has turned out his resignation as though it wasn't forced. He is also eligible."

"We have showed the connection between Senator Bailey of Texas and the Standard Oil company. He, however, was able to fool the Texas voters into re-electing him to the senate. However, he cannot fool the people all of the time. He will be eligible before long."

"The Independence party has never been stashed by such men as the aforementioned. It is conducted by men who are above such dealings. It is the hope of the mass, the laboring people. It is your only relief if you demand that the people shall rule."

**CHURCHES TO UNITE.**

Baptist Congregations in Salt Lake Decide to Become One.

The Congregation B'nai Israel wishes to use its temple on Fourth East street next Sunday, so the First Baptists will unite for the day with the East Side Baptist church in the latter's edifice.

The permanent union, however, of the two organizations will not occur for some time yet, as there are certain business matters to be settled by each one before that time. The indications are now that the present pastor of the East Side church will be retained as the pastor of the new organization, and that the present designs of the new church edifice to be erected at Second South and Fourth East street, will be enlarged by the acquisition of adjoining real estate, to accommodate the enlarged congregation.

There never was any real necessity for the establishment of a second Baptist church in this city, as according to one of the prominent members of the First church, a traveling missionary of the denomination has indicated the First church people to start a mission in 1901 at Seventh East and Third South streets, where a new church building is being erected under his supervision, the means being furnished by the First church and the church members in the East Side.

When the building was up, it is charged that the missionary, Rev. S. C. Adams, was told by the First church people that they would make a separate and independent church with himself as the pastor. This was done to the chagrin of the First church people who saw some of their best members thus taken away from them as pillars of the new organization.

Mr. Adams did not retain his pastorate long, but the church remained a separate one, though it did not get only one of its members. Two years ago, members of both churches agreed that a reunion is the best thing that can be done. The present East Side church building will be used as the mission when the new church at Second South and Fourth East is erected. So, after all, the East Side edifice will revert to the purpose for which it was originally intended.

## DISCUSS SYSTEM OF APPRENTICESHIP

Carpenters and Joiners Spend Morning Session in Considering Question.

INCREASE DUES FIVE CENTS

Action Considered Necessary to Provide for Old Age Pension—Des Moines Ahead in Race.

At the Monday session of the Carpenters and Joiners' convention, the apprentice system, discussed at some length at Friday's session, was considered and after a long discussion was referred to a special committee to go into at great length, and will be reported upon again later in the convention.

At the afternoon session one of the most far reaching acts of the convention was taken, when the body decided on an increase of five cents a month in the dues of each member to provide a fund for old age pensions.

As the rules stands members of the brotherhood who have reached 60 years of age, having been active members for a continuous period of 25 years, will receive a pension of \$250 per year. If a member is unable to earn more than 75 cents of the standard wage for his locality in which he lives, he will be entitled to receive full old age benefits.

The rest of the afternoon session was devoted principally to routine business. The annual report of the president, William D. Huber, was concerned in by the convention, as was also the report of the general executive board.

**TODAY'S SESSION.**

General officers will be nominated tomorrow and will be elected by referendum vote the third week of November. The election of seven delegates to the convention of the American Federation of Labor and the convention of building and trades department of the American Federation of Labor, both of which will be held in Denver in November, will take place today. It is expected that the election of these fourteen delegates will take up the entire day.

For the next biennial convention, indications are in favor of Des Moines. Secy. Duffy received a telegram Monday from Governor Cummings of Iowa, inviting the brotherhood to come to Des Moines for the convention of 1900. Governor Cummings is a member of the brotherhood and it is expected that this will have great weight with the convention. Denver and San Francisco are the only other competitive cities. The delegates are enthusiastic over the excellent entertainment afforded them here. They will visit Bingham tomorrow.

**SCHOOL BOARD OPENS BIDS.**

Of Four Tenders Received That of Vanderhorst Bros. is Lowest.

Bids for the erections of the new school building south of Ninth South, between Main and West Temple, were opened by the board of education yesterday. It will be named the Jefferson, will contain 18 rooms and will be by far the most pretentious school edifice in the city. A picture of the plans was reproduced in the "News" Thursday of last week.

There were four bids submitted on the general contract, namely each bidder figuring on the regular plan and alternative plan as follows: Under Dean, \$1,620; \$1,830; Fred Dryer, \$20,785; Vanderhorst Bros., \$75,000, \$71,000; J. W. A. Timms & Son, \$35,400, \$36,300.

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From these figures it will be seen that the bid of Vanderhorst Brothers was the lowest, and it was referred to the architect, Richard Kletting, to be reported upon Oct. 6. The bid was accepted by a certified check, which was retained by the board, while the checks of the other bidders were returned to their respective owners. Bids on heating, plumbing, electric wiring and steel re-enforcement were received as follows: Heating—Green & Reeve, \$9,270; Will Reese Plumbing Co., \$9,300; Carthy & Dumbek, \$9,850; Midgley Bros., \$11,827; Hisgen & Rossiter, \$9,707; George G. Doyle & Co., \$9,097; Plumbing—Green & Reeve, \$5,280; Will Reese Plumbing Co., \$4,865; Carthy & Dumbek, \$6,175; Midgley Bros., \$5,250; Hisgen & Rossiter, \$4,880.
