White of the Bing-ham Consolidated Mining and Smelting company, states that he has received a request from the so-called protective committee interests, represented by Lawyer Thomas J. Barry, that the meeting of the Bingham stockholders called for April 15, he postponed "until a further opportunity to investigate is given." says the Boston News Bu-reau,

reau, President White has notified Mr. Barry that he is perfectly willing to have the meeting adjourned until a later date, and would weleome any sug-gestions or plans from any interested parties as to how best to solve the com-pany's financial difficulties.
