Is Stricken With Heart Failure Thurs-

About 10:30 o'clock, as he was driving a wagon near the corner of Twenty-eighth street and Washington avenue, he was seen to fall over backward from his seat. Workmen in the employ of J. P. O'Neil rushed to his assistance, but before medical aid arrived he was dead. Mr. Dalton is well known in Ogden, having been connected with the Allen Transfer company for the past 14 years. He was familiarly known as "Tom" Dalton and was very popular in his line of business. Mr. Dalton was born in Salt Lake, Feb. 2, 1861, but has resided here nearly all his life. He is survived by a wife, four daughters, and two sons, all of whom reside here.

SMALLPOX EPIDEMIC AT SPRINGVILLE

Twenty Houses Quarantined With
About 40 Cases—Schools and Public Buildings Suspended.

(Special Correspondence.)
SPRINGVILLE, Oct. 29.—An epidemic of a mild form of smallpox has this town in its grasp and all schools and public buildings have been suspended indefinitely. About 40 cases have been reported and some 20 houses are under quarantine.

There is also much typhoid fever here. Dr. H. H. Huntington of the First ward is among those most severely afflicted at the present time.

REPUBLICANS OF LEHI ISSUE PRONOUNCEMENT

LEHI, Oct. 28.—Being fully convinced that the majority of the citizens of Lehi are in favor of prohibition, the city council decided to put the city to the expense of voting on the question. Consequently on this decision the Republican party candidates sent out the following pronouncement:

"To the Citizens of Lehi:
"Inasmuch as the nonintoxication of the Republic party in Lehi City have been accused of not being in favor of prohibition, we, the nominees of said party, do hereby declare ourselves to be unconditionally in favor of prohibition for Lehi City."
"And, inasmuch as the present city council has not seen fit to submit the matter of prohibition to a separate and direct vote of the people as recommended by the Republican platform, we, the nominees of the Republican party, wish to go on record as endorsing the action of the present city council in passing what is known as the prohibition ordinance, and if elected, we will uphold and rigorously enforce, by every legal and proper means, said prohibition ordinance unless changed by a demand of the people."
To declaration is signed by James H. Gardner, G. A. Goates, Walter L. Webb, W. E. Rucker, R. L. Comer, J. E. Bone, J. C. Goates and Samuel Taylor. A Republican rally will be held in the opera house Monday night, Nov. 1.
