Cardston, Alberta, Canada, Jan. 15 .--This is a holiday for Cardston and vicinity. For some time past the agricultural department of the Dominion has advertised what has come to be known as the "Gospel Seed Train," in other words, the "Seed Selection Special." This is a train of five or six cars, comfortably arranged and attractively decorated with samples of grains and seeds; mounted specimens of grasses and noxious weeds, together with carefully tabulated charts with statistics showing the farmer what he looses through carelessness in cultivation of soil and what he gains in selection and proper treatment of seed grains. There is nothing like "showing" a man what he is doing that is wrong or what he might avoid with very little effort and yet produce greater results. hence the government has adopted this method of letting the tillers of soil see wherein they have lost this year alone. twenty millions of dollars through smut and weedy grains, as well as poor quality, through lack of selected seeds. It is to be hoped that the 200 or more farmers who were here today, wh saw and heard the good things to be ac-complished in the right way, will spread the "Gospel" of good seed and better tilled lands.
