THE OPERA HOUSE CASE SETTLED.

Death of Harry Ford, a Recording Clerk of the Union Pacific.

Judge Bishop yesterday received a dispatch announcing the death at Des Moines, Iowa, of his aged mother.

A NEW CHORAL SOCIETY.

Pray New has seen its organization.—Musical Matters in General.

A new feature has been added to the musical department of the Brigham Young Academy, consisting of a class in singing known as the Choral Society of the Brigham Young Academy.

Over two hundred numbers are enunciated, all earnest workers. A system of rehearsing has been adopted, now in use.

Each section meets separately for one hour to rehearse the respective parts, after which they all join in the large assembly room, to receive training for the blessing of voices and balancing of parts.

The roll-call was December 13th, with over two hundred members, and the choir is well organized.

Twelve choristers, six, six, have been selected from the works of the great masters.

Each number is requested to commit words and music at their respective rehearsals.

Choirs are being organized throughout the state which will swell the number to five hundred voices.

The section of Pratt George Charles has been organized to train an amateur choir, five pieces comprising the chorus and organists a party of fine musical selections.

Prof. W. C. Clift, the Utah violinist, has been engaged to represent Utah at this meeting. Prof. Clift is a Utah boy, and no genius is as credit to the Territory.

Mrs. Lillian Roberts, the first soprano of Utah, also a Utah girl, will appear as soloist.

Prof. G. H. Gilkes, the director, also born in the Territory, is a hard worker. He only deserves but is certain of success.

Arrangements are being made for the large choir and orchestra to appear at the World's Fair in Chicago on Utah Day, July 24th.

A FRIGHTFUL RUNAWAY.

The Driver Escapes Unhurt but the Horse is Killed by Colliding With a Pole.

A well known citizen whose medical name is marked that he strongly deems to be using his name in print had a rather exciting and expensive experience last night. He hired a spined horse and one of the most fashionable carriages owned by Henry Carrigan of the Salt Lake stables and proceeded to indulge in the luxury of a night ride. At the White Horse stable the horse turned westward and was soon met by a team of horses which had been sent to the White Street where he suddenly came in contact with a telephone pole with such force as to crush in his head bony otherwise injurying himself.

John H. Hanson, a resident of that vicinity, witnessed the collision and led the poor brute bleeding and reeling, as far as Second West street, between Second and Third streets and where he stopped. The animal was then secured. The doctor said Mr. Carrigan was one of the three drivers and was valued at \$300. The loss will be sustained by the amiable well known citizen, who has an aversion to seeing his name in the paper.
