## BREVITIES.

A gallon of milk weighs eight and a half pounds.

There are now 70,000 Israelites in New York, and 1,500,000 of Israelites in the whole of the United States.

The Chinese are great novel readers.— Cheap novels are published in China almost as rapidly as in France.

The Italian population is about twenty-three millions. Seventeen millions cannot read or write.

A family in Detroit was badly poisoned by eating beefsteak which had lain for thirty-six hours on a plate of zinc before it was cooked.

The oldest journal in the world is published in Pekin, China, it is printed on silk, and has appeared every year for more than a thousand years.

S. R. Cram, of Livingston County, Illinois, says he has a Merino ram which last season produced eight pounds and six ounces of scoured wool.

A correspondent of the Iowa Homestead says there seems to be no more difficulty in cultivating a grove of maple trees, grown from the seed, than in cultivating corn.

Europe is at peace, yet her armies number 2,800,000 men, and in time of war, the effective force would be 5,000,000. They cost nearly £80,000,000 a year.

One hundred years ago, there were in all four newspapers in the United States with a combined circulation of less than two thousand.

The last census of Great Britain showed that there were in Victoria's kingdom 14,459,314 males and 15,467,000 females.

Oregon possesses sixty-three flouring mills, fifty-five of which, with 100 run of stones, are worked by water power. Several of these mills turn out from 200 to 300 barrels of flour per day.

Canada has about 34,000 active militia, of which Ontario and Quebec have 31,000, Nova Scotia 1,000, and New Brunswick 2,000. The enrolled militia of the Dominion numbers about 142,000.

Chicago possesses forty distilleries—twenty-five large and fifteen small—makes twenty-five thousand barrels of spirituous drinks a year, and has two thousand saloons, or one to every sixty members of her adult population.

A single grain of gold may be hammered by a gold beater until it will cover fifty square inches; each quarter inch may be divided into two hundred strips, and each strip into two hundred parts. One of these parts is the two-millionth part of a grain of gold, yet it may be seen with the naked eye.

LONGEVITY OF MULES.—We have numerous reports of mules attaining the age of forty, fifty, or sixty years, and Col. Middleton, of South Carolina, stated some years ago that he had one at work on his plantation eighty years old; and we have seen accounts of a mule in Ireland, certified to have been at work since 1707, making him over 150 years old. This of course is a very uncommon age; but we are satisfied that, with proper usage, mules would commonly attain to about forty years, being serviceable to the last—and this should be counted as one of their elements of virtue.

The bottom of the ocean will soon be as extensive a means of human intelligence as the top of it. The Emperor of France is about to have a submarine cable to the Island of St. Pierre and New York; the Government of Queen Isabella is also about laying down a cable to Cuba and Porto Rico by way of the Canaries; and now we hear of another projected line between Brest and New York. The latter is organized by a capital of a million sterling—the stock and direction to be divided between England, France and this country. The English share of the stock is said to be already subscribed. This company has received valuable concessions from the French Government, and the line will be laid next summer very probably.—New York Times.
