Yesterday afternoon, while engaged in appraising stock in the cellar of the late G. Goldberg, on Fourth Street, Mr. Adolph Schenckbach met with a painful accident. Believing some of the barrels being appraised were empty, he struck one with his right foot, when a barrel on top rolled down and severely crushed his left foot. —Ogden Herald.

The D. & R. G. Railway Co. purpose putting up some mammoth water tanks. Two have already arrived at the depot in this city—one for the Provo station and the other for the Clear Creek station. They are of equal size, being 16 feet high by 24 feet in diameter. They are the largest and most substantial tanks brought into the Territory. —Territorial Enquirer.

Old Times.—In conversation with Brother John Van Cott, yesterday, he informed us that he is the only living witness of the baptism of the late Apostle Orson Pratt, which occurred 51 years ago last September 19th. He was acquainted with Elder Pratt when he was quite a young boy, several years before he joined the Church. Brother Van Cott was also present when Elder Pratt first heard the gospel preached by Parley P. Pratt and Ziba Peterson.

Elder Van Cott is himself 67 years old, hale, hearty and vigorous, being probably one of the "youngest men of his age" in Utah.

Small-Pox.—It is rumored that this disease has reached Cedar City, Iron County, but we sincerely hope the report is untrue. The following statement appears in the *Silver Reef Miner* of the 10th inst:

"We are reliably informed that this pestilence has broken out at Cedar City, and on Wednesday last three cases of a pronounced type were under treatment there. This is greatly to be regretted, and at the same time calls for the most active measures to prevent the spread of the contagion in our midst. While we know of no way to quarantine against it, we can be on the alert; and should the slightest symptoms appear in any portion of the community, proper measures should at once be resorted to."

Ladies' Conference.—The Ladies' Conference of Tooele Stake was held at Grandville, on Saturday and Sunday, the 10th and 11th of December. Mrs. M. A. Hunter presiding. Sisters E. R. S. Smith and E. R. Wells, of this city, were in attendance. Apostle F. M. Lyman was also present and addressed the meeting.

On Sunday morning Sisters Young and Wells attended the Sunday school and spoke a short time to the children. In the afternoon, after the administration of the Sacrament, the meeting was addressed by Sisters Grant, Foster and Wells, followed by Pres. H. J. Grant and Apostle F. M. Lyman.

On Monday morning, at 9 o'clock, the Primary Association met, Mrs. Louisa Hale presiding. There were about 100 children present, and the time was spent in giving good sound to the little folks.

ANOTHER GOOD WOMAN GONE.

SISTER MARTHA JANE CORAY DEPARTED TO THE GREAT BEYOND.

This morning Hon. W. H. Hooper received a dispatch from Brother Wilson H. Dusenberry, of Provo, informing him that Mrs. Martha Jane Coray died at her residence at 11 o'clock last night. Some of the sons of the deceased who have been at work on the Denver and Rio Grande R.R. are now on their way home. As they will not reach Provo for several days, the funeral will be delayed pending their arrival. Captain Hooper proposed sending Sexton Taylor south, to place the body in a condition to keep the desired time.

Deceased is the wife of Brother Howard Coray, sister to Mrs. Hooper, and related by marriage to Prof. T. B. Lewis. She was 59 years of age, and, having been a woman of most indomitable energy, probably died from general debility. She was a woman among ten thousand. She became identified with the Church in Illinois, shortly after the Saints were expelled from Missouri, when she was a mere girl, being the first of her family to embrace the gospel. Almost by her own exertions she reared a family of twelve children, eleven of whom are still living. She was possessed of great independence of character, marked natural intelligence and considerable culture. The nobler traits of womanhood have been exhibited in her life to a degree that is seldom excelled. Sister Coray was intensely beloved by her children, to whose training she had devoted the greater portion of her life's best energies. The same feeling exists in the hearts of her other connections, Captain Hooper and his wife being deeply grieved at her departure. Sister Coray will be held in affectionate remembrance by a very large circle of friends. She came to Utah 31 years ago.

Professor Fowler's Lecture.—

Professor Fowler's lecture in the Theatre last night was a most unqualified success. If we may be allowed to judge from the numbers present, the auditorium was filled with a sardine box from centre to circumference.
