# REVOLUTION

Government Troops Attacked the Rebels Who Had Fortified Themselves at Mendoza.

### UNCONDITIONAL SURRENDER.

Movement is Now Restricted to Cordoba, Which is Surrounded by Superior Forces.

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 6, -Government troops attacked the rebels, who fortified themselves at Mendoza, at dawn today. Soon afterward the rebel leaders and officers fled to the mountains and the men surrendered unconditionally. The rebels had sacked the local branch of the National Bank of Buenos Ayres, and seized \$300,000. Numerous arrests have been made and the city is now quiet.

Late information shows that the insurrectionary movement is now restricted to Cordoba, Gens. Wintter, Benavides, Garcia and Roca, with largely superior forces, are surrounding the city. The rebels are holding Senator Yofre.

The Buenos Ayres police have seized a quantity of guns and revolvers, and also many copies of manifestos and revolutionary documents. Night trains on the line between Buenos Ayes and Rosario will be resumed again tomor-row. All the bankers here condenn the

row. All the bankers here condemn the attempted revolution, and express the hope that the energetic policy of President Quintana will prevent any such attempt in the future.

The only group of rebels in the province of Buenos Ayres, 170 men strong, has been defeated near Pirovano station. Two officers and seven men were killed and 121 surrendered. The rest, with Commandant Villamahor, are retreating, and government troops are in treating, and government troops are in

The insurrection is admitted to have been a failure, and the government now has matters well in hand. Yester-day the military rebels at Cordoba enday the military rebels at Cordoba en-deavored to make terms with the gov-ernment by offering to surrender if they were absolved and permitted to retain their rank, threatening that if candi-tions were refused they would hold as hostages Dr. Alcorta, the vice presi-dent of the republic, and other notable persons who were surprised and cap-tured in that city on Saturday. Presi-dent Quintana declined to listen to any compromise, adding that rebels had no rights as combatants, and would be compromise, adding that reverse had for rights as combistants, and would be amenable to military law. The prompt suppression of the outbreak would indicate the absence of all the usual clements of a revolution. The rising was purely military, and was limited in its recreations.

Foreign Minister Larrette has taken measures for the arrest, should they reach Chilian territory, of the insur-rectionists concerned in the pillaging of the branch of the National Bank of Mendoza. It is rumored that the dead at Mendoza number more than 100.

The minister of interior has sent a telegram to the governors of the varicus provinces, informing them that order has been re-established, and that consequently the extraordinary measares that were ordered instituted are no longer necessary.

## ELECTION SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN HONEST

Witnesses in Peabody Adams Contest Put Writing Experts In a Bad Light.

SUPREME COURT WATCHERS

Testified That Despite Claims of Fraud They Culy Saw a Quiet, Orderly Election.

Denver, Feb. 6.-Nine witnesses were xamined today in the Peabody-Adams gubernatorial contest. Two of the vitnesses, who are well known citizens, had been declared not to reside in the claces from which they voted. They estified they had lived at these places or some time,

The judges and clerks of precinct 3, ward 3, all declared that the election was fair and honest. One of them went over a list of names declared by the canvassers to be made up of nonresidents. The witnesses recognized from half a dozen to two score of the names, and declared they were genuine voters.

The Republican attorneys discovered 71 votes cast from the St. Joe hotel and examined all the witnesses on this point. One of them declared there were 35 rooms in the house, which was a workingmen's hotel, and that each room contained from two to three beds. Several witnesses also identified their bailots, which had been pronounced

fraudulent by experts.

A number of witnesses were called at the night session and all identified their ballots. The witnesses also testified to the honesty of the election in their pre-

the honesty of the election in their pre-cincts. Some of the witnesses admitted that there had been fraudulent regis-tration, but they had seen no evidence of fraudulent voting. Hattle A. Davidson, a Republican judge in precinct 9, ward 4, who is also secretary to Chairman Williams of the Peruphican city committee testified Republican city committee, testified that in her opinion there had been no fraudulent voting in her present. The expert reported seventeen spurious bal-lots, after his examination of the bal-lots cast in this precinct. Thomas A. Smith, Democratic judge in precinct 13, ward 11, said he knew 44 of the 64 persons whose ballots were classed among the number denounced fraudulent by

the experts.

Seven supreme court watchers were on the stand and declared that despite the claims of fraud made by the ex-perts, they had witnessed only quiet and orderly elections in the precincts to which they had been assigned.

MRS. CHADWICK'S CREDITORS Receiver Files a List of Them So Far as Known.

Cleveland, Feb. 6.—Receiver Loesser-filed a list of the creditors of Mrs. Chadwick, together with the amount due each, so far as known, in the United States bankruptcy court today. While it is understood, unofficially, that Mrs. Chadwick's debts will aggregate close to \$2,000,000, the claims thus far presented to the receiver foot up a total of only \$63,310. Report on Korean Trade.

Washington, Feb. 6—The state department is in receipt of a report on the commerce and industries of Korea and the effect of the war on the trade of Korea, by Gordon Paddock, the American consul-general at Seoul, Korea Mr. Paddock says, there being a large number of troops to be fed and large rail-way and other undertakings being pushed forward in Kofea, there has been much money distributed throughout the country, and that the Korean laborer often has had more ready money than it was ever his lot to enjoy.

The consul-general says that on account of the orderly manner in which the campaign in Korea has been conducted the regular routine has been conducted the regular routine has been conducted the has been an immense immigration of Japanese, mostly laborers and small merchants, and much of the available land in the treaty ports, notably Fusan and Chemulpo and the city of Seoul, has been bought by Japanese. The consul-general says American interests in Korea today undoubtedly are greater than those of any European nation.

LONDON & S. F. BANK. Tax Collector Not Allowed to Collect Taxes Against It.

San Francisco, Feb. 6.—The United State circuit court of appeals today reversed an order of the circuit court permitting the tax collector of San Francisco to collect taxes on \$557.313 worth of property that was assessed to the London & San Francisco bank. In April, 1896, the assessor demanded from the bank a statement of its property. It was given and the tax on the amount specified was tendered, but the tax collector refused it, claiming that in addition there were taxes due on \$12,000 worth of other credits—\$115.744 due the bank by the Portland and \$425.537 due by the Tacoma branch. The bank claimed that these amounts were not assessable in the city and county of San Francisco. The circuit court sustained the contention of the tax collector, but the appellate court holds the bank's claim was just

A Defrauder of Women.

Burnett was taken before Commissioner Humphrey and waived examination. He returned to Pittsburg.

New York, Feb. 7.—Negotiations are, according to the World, under way between the North American company and Brown Brothers & Co., for the purchase by the former of control of the \$90,000,000 street railway system of St. Louis. Satisfactory progress is said to have been made, but there are several obstacles to be overcome, and pending a settlement of these, it is understood, no formal statement will be made.

The North American company recently bought control of several lighting and power corporations in St. Louis. It also operates public utilities in many other large cities of the central and far west.

RAPID FIRE GUNS.

Russians Propose to Mount Them On Automobile Cars.

Chicago, Feb. 7.—Rapid-fire guns mounted on automobile cars are to be used by the Russians for the protection of the Trans-Siberian railroad. Six of these cars have been ordered by Nicholas Summerfield of Moscow, a representation of the Russian Residence of the Russian tative of the Russian government, who has visited the Chicago Automobile show. They were ordered for immediate delivery, and will be sent to Russia from Detroit within the next two

weeks.

The cars will be especially built with extended platforms in front and rear, to hold the guns, it being further specified that they are to be equipped with 30-horsepower motors of high speed.

SIBERIAN TELEGRAPH.

Russian Government Assumed Control of it on Monday.

London, Feb. 7.—Much speculation has been caused here by the fact that the Russian government on Monday assumed control of the Siberian telegraph lines from 8 o'clock in the morning until 4 in the afternoon. It is said to be the first occasion on which telegraph communication has been stopped since the war began. Various possible causes are discussed, such as the strike movement to the Siberian railway and important correspondence with Gen. Kuropatkin.

Little attention is paid to rumors of peace mediation, but the Chronicle's St. Petersburg correspondent sends the statement—which, however, is not confirmed in other dispatches—that the recent conferences of the grand ducal party to consider the far eastern prospects arrived at an agreement as to the desirability of ending the war, and that the rumor of Gen. Kuropatkin's resignation was started to facilitate negotiations for peace.

Did Not Prosecute Einstein.

Chicago, Feb. 6.—Actress Dorothy Russell Einstein failed to appear in court here today against her husband, whom she recently had arrested on a charge of making threats to kill her. Upon request of an attorney representing Mrs. Einstein the case was dismissed, Mrs. Einstein not wishing to prosecute her husband.

To Work on Panama Canal. Colon, Feb. 6.—The steamer Tagus arrived here today, bringing 100 laborers from Barbardos and 260 from Jamaica, under contract to work on the canal. These will be placed along the line, mostly for Culebra.

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


