CHIVINGTON IS ELECTED HEAD

Chosen President of American Baseball Association Over J. D. O'Brien—Wins on the First Ballot.

Chicago, Dec. 29.—Thomas M. Chivington was elected president of the American Baseball Association over J. D. O'Brien at the annual meeting today. Chivington won in the first ballot by five votes to three.

O'Brien, the incumbent, did not make a battle as expected, as it was thought he was prominent enough to cause a deadlock on the first ballot.

The association also decided to play a 162-game schedule in 1910, elected W. B. Armour of Toledo vice president and decided to hold the scheduled meeting at Chicago at the time of the American league meeting, about Feb. 15.

A rule was passed requiring all clubs to provide dressing rooms at the park for the players. President Chivington announced the league headquarters would be moved to Chicago on Feb. 1.

George Tebeau was re-elected chairman of the board of directors but there may be a contest on his right to serve. The election of Chivington was somewhat of a surprise. The three northern clubs—Minnesota, St. Paul and Milwaukee—stood solidly behind O'Brien, but that was all the support he could muster.

The continuance of the 162-game schedule met with little opposition and the financial success of the last season caused the managers to adopt it again. The season will begin on April 13, and probably end on Sept. 26.

FEW TRADES MADE

There was little doing on the trade line, Roger Bresnahan, manager of the St. Louis Nationals, was the only major leaguer present. He was trying to dispose of some of his surplus youngsters.

Jack McCarthy, manager of the Danville Three "I" league team, received an offer from Walter McCready to manage the Portland Northwestern league team, but refused.

Pitcher Packard of the Louisville team was sold to Columbus.

It was announced that four members of the Chicago Americans were sold to the San Francisco Pacific league. The sold were Catcher Warring, formerly of the Guthrie (Okla.) team; Pitcher Harry Stewart of the Houston (Tex.) team; Pitcher Frank Miller of the Dallas team; and Outfielder Plannagan, a Pacific product.

LEHI FIVE WINS FROM BOULDERITES

The crack Boulder, Colo., basketball team met a crushing defeat at the hands of the Lehi high school five Wednesday evening. The game was played at Lehi and was witnessed by a large and enthusiastic crowd of basketball fans. The final score was 22 to 23. The first half ended with a score of 12 to 10 in favor of the Lehi boys but in the second half the Utahns ran away from the Colorado team.

Coch Castleton of the visitors said the Lehi boys played the best game for a high school team he ever saw. He said his team would have done better but for the fact that the players were all tired from a long journey, and that his team would be in fine form for the game with the Y. M. C. A. five. The visitors play the Apollo team this evening. The Lehi team is coached by Coach Castleton.

CHAMPIONSHIP RACE RUN ON FRIDAY

Eight or 10 of the fastest amateurs in the city will compete Friday night in a two-mile roller skating race for the championship of the city at the Richards street rink. Since the opening of the season there have been many requests for such a contest. Willie Schatz is the state champion and is considered to be the fastest in the city on the little wheels. It has been decided to put on an amateur race, free-for-all, and suitable prizes will be awarded the winner. A course 32 laps to the mile will be marked off for the race. The event will be one of many features of a New Year's party.

CANADA A. A. F. HAS DISBANDED

Amateur Athletes Desiring to Compete in Canada Must Get Sanction From Two Governing Bodies.

New York, Dec. 29.—New York headquarters of the A. A. U. has received official notification from the amateur athletic federation of Canada that, at a meeting recently held in Montreal, the federation officially disbanded, and is now a part of a new body that will govern sports in Canada.

This action leaves the A. A. U. with only Canadian athletes desiring to compete in Canada, must apply for a permit there and must also have the permission of the A. A. U.
