TWO HOMES BURNED BY SUBORN FIRE

Low Water Pressure Handicaps Firemen—Neighbors Barely Escape Bad Blaze.

A bad fire occurred in the southern part of the city yesterday afternoon and only the determined and speedy work of the fire department prevented the loss of many thousands of dollars' worth of property. Five houses were burned more or less, two totally destroyed, the total loss reaching nearly \$6,000.

The fire started in the home owned by Joseph T. Tackett, occupied by George Gibbs and family, 415 Walnut avenue. Joseph E. Morris discovered the blaze and hastening to the Gibbs home notified them of the fire. The family had barely time to gather up their few articles and escape from the burning building. An alarm was turned in and the apparatus from No. 5 and Asst. Chief Strayer, from headquarters responded. They made the long run in good time and stretched two lines of hose but the water pressure was so weak it was almost impossible to get water through the hose. An engine soon arrived and in a short time two streams of water were pouring into the flames.

The residence of I. Tackett, 2412, then caught fire and although the men worked heroically, they found it impossible to save either the Gibbs or Tackett home. While battling with the flames work was resumed with the hand chains. Then the house of Mrs. Mary Neve, nearly a block away, Sparks had fallen on the roof. This blaze was quickly extinguished with hand chains. Then the house of Martin Needburg, 2408 Walnut street, caught fire, and the firemen had a hard time in preventing the spread of the flames to the place. The residence of Mrs. Sarah Fowler, 740 Simpson avenue, was slightly damaged.

WILL RELAY SIDEWALKS.

Assures Property Owners Work Will Be Satisfactory.

When the resolutions protesting against the manner in which James Kennedy, contractor, was laying sidewalk extension No. 108 came up for consideration last night before the council committee, Michael O'Connor, superintendent for Kennedy, said that every foot of unsatisfactory pavement would be relaid. He told the committee that he was under \$50,000 bond for the proper completion of the work, and explained that the property owners were protected by his bond. The property-owners present seemed satisfied if the contractor would relaid all the inferior work and no action was taken by the committee.

The foot viaduct which is being constructed by the Oregon Short Line railroad company will be visited tomorrow by the city engineer and the company's construction engineer. If the position is not satisfactory and does not comply with the franchise, the road company has pledged its willingness to place the viaduct wherever the council suggests.

The waterworks committee met in Mayor Superintendent Holaday's office yesterday morning and received bids on supplies to be used in connection with water mains.

SCHOOL BOARD SESSION.

Contract Awarded for Addition to Wasatch School—New Member.

The contract for the erection of an 11-room addition to the Wasatch school building was awarded last night by the board of education to O. Chytrus, whose bid of \$4,541 was the lowest submitted. For the plumbing and heating of the new building, Hagen & Rosner received the award. The firm's bid was \$1,700. The contracts will be executed today by the president and secretary.

The clerk was authorized to advertise for bids for janitors' supplies for the coming school year. The committee on buildings and grounds was authorized to advertise for bids for school supplies for the same year.

Options have been secured on a piece of property between Second and Third East, and between 1st and 2nd South streets, which is suggested as a site for a proposed school building. The matter of securing the site was left to a committee.

According to several members of the board Vander Root Bros. have been ditatory about proceedings with their contract of the school building on the Walker site. Unless the contractors make some haste, the building will not be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the coming school year. It was unanimously agreed that the name of the new building will be the Jefferson school.

When the board meets on March 19, it is probable that a decision will be made as to whether the building will be named. No names have been mentioned for the place and it is probable that the board will follow the general custom of showing the names of the deceased member to

choose a successor. In this case it will be Judge H. P. Henderson, but he said that he had no candidate in mind and had not heard of any.
