Utah Senator Declares Himself To be a Thorough and Consistent One.

HE IS NOT ONE IN SPOTS.

Would Accord to Other States That Which He Claims For His Own.

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RATE CASE HELD IN ABEYANCE

Complaints Filed by Commercial Club Reposing Peacefully On Official's Desk.

SENATORS HOLD CONFERENCE

C., May 17.—The complaints received from the Commercial Club Traffic bureau of Salt Lake City, and shippers from Salt Lake, Ogden and Provo against the alleged extortionate rates and discriminations of the Harriman lines, addressed to President Taft, by him referred to the attorney-general and decided by that official to be incomplete, now repose peacefully on the desk of Interstate Commerce Commissioner Lane.

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CAPT. HAINS SENTENCED

Indeterminate, Being Not Less Than Eight, Nor More Than Sixteen Years.

HARD LABOR IS IMPOSED.

His Counsel Made Motion for New Trial Which Judge Garretson Denied.

Flushing, N. Y., May 17.—Capt. Peter C. Hains, U. S. A., who was convicted of manslaughter in the first degree for killing William E. Amis at the Dayside Yacht club last August was sentenced today by Justice Garretson in the supreme court to an indeterminate sentence of not less than eight years, nor more than 16 years at hard labor in state's prison, John C. McIntyre, who had been the defendant made the usual motion for a new trial on the ground that the verdict was against the weight of evidence and also contrary to law.

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ACCOUNTS OF TAFT'S GOLF PLAYING MADE HIM TIRED

New York, May 17.—Albert Hoppert, 70 years old, had become so disgusted with long articles in newspapers concerning President Taft's golf playing that when he came upon another of these narratives yesterday in his home at Fair Ground, L.
