

## DILLON AND O'BRIEN.

An Enraged Crowd Beheads the Two Members of Parliament at Cork.

THE PARLIAMENT ATTACKED BY A MOB.

Troops Called Out to Protect the Open Air Meeting of the Republicans.

BY TELEGRAM TO THE NEWS.

**THE IRISH PARTIES.**

O'Brien Wants to Give the People a Voice in Parliament.

CORK, Oct. 27.—William O'Brien and John Dillon arrived here today. The two distinguished Republicans were received by a delegation of an enormous crowd of people. The procession was headed by a band and assisted by a strong detachment of troops.

During his speech at the Assembly rooms, said he was willing to give fair play to his opponents, but what had he would not yield to them. He would not let the Anti-slavery party or the Constitutional Contrarians, O'Brien said that they (the Parlementaires) might sweep up the office of the newspaper expressing the views of the people. He said that he was anxious to see them "extinct before the spirit which animates that party."

O'Brien further declared that it is impossible for him to be a member of Parliament from Cork. This movement, however, called upon D.G. to bring up the case.

As soon as the question closed the proceedings, Dillon and O'Brien passed through the city, still accompanied by the procession which met them at the railroad station. Suddenly the McCarron, supporters of the Constitutional Party, who were in the ranks of the Parlementaires, and both sides fought desperately with clubs, sticks, stones and clubs. A detachment of mounted police, who were at their posts, and their horses in between the two lines of combatants, striking right and left with the butts of their rifles, and two shooting-sabers of stones and clubs.

A large number of spectators, stretched bleeding and groaning in the streets before the troops rendered order. The neighboring hospital had to find accommodation for many persons who were injured by the time the troops were summoned. There is great excitement everywhere in Cork this evening. The indignant crowd, it is said, will not be satisfied until it is known that the battle between them would be renewed.

The advancing troops have turned to the square for the protection of the crowd, and are surrounded by British and soldiers.

BY TELEGRAM TO THE NEWS.
