[From the N. T. Evening Post of June 17.] GCV. CUMMING'S OFFICIAL ACCOUNT OF HIS RECEPTION AT SALT LAKE CITY.

The following is Gov. Cumming's despatch to the Secretary of State, narrating his experiences in Salt Lake City:-

EXECUTIVE OFFICE,

Great Salt Lake City, U. T., May 2, 1858. Sir: You are aware that my contemplated journey was postponed in consequence of the snow on the mountains, and in the kanyons between Fort Bridger and this city. In accordance with the determination communicated in former notes, I left camp on the 5th and arrived here on the 12th ult.

Some of the incidents of my journey are related in the annexed note, addressed by me to Colonel A. S. Johnston, on the 15th ult:
