Enquirer's Notes.—From Saturday's issue: Arrangements are being made for a grand celebration of Pioneer Day in American Fork. Orders have been received to add 50 miles more to the Utah Southern Extension Railroad. It will not be long, at the rate the railroad is being built through Southern Utah, before we are connected by railroad with the Southern Pacific.

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City Council.—Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, July 20th, 1890. Mayor Little presiding.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of Messrs. Spurgeon and R. C. Plummer, asking that certain repairs be made to Plum street, reported that they had considered the matter and recommended the improvement of said street for a distance of about forty rods, between Centre and First West streets. The committee also recommended that the city discontinue taking out gravel from the bed of the south side of Plum street, near Captain Hooper's residence, and that the same be fenced for the security of citizens and the prevention of persons from hauling away more of the gravel.

The Mayor stated that frequent complaints had been made by citizens of the nuisance occasioned by the animals corralled in the estray pound in the Fourteenth Ward, and suggested that the city establish an estray pound of its own upon Washington Square.

On motion, a portion of Washington Square was ordered to be set aside for an estray pound, and the Mayor authorized the superintendent of the establishment thereof.

The subject of drafting an ordinance in relation to an estray pound, in accordance with provisions in the city charter, was referred to the committee on municipal laws.

The Mayor asked for further advice relating to the leasing of Market Lot, on the corner of West Temple and First South Streets, which subject was referred to him at a recent session of the Council. He desired an expression from the Council as to how long they would be willing to give a lease, and under what restrictions, etc.

On motion, the Mayor was authorized to lease the whole of the Market lot, including the building on a former session of the Council, with the privilege to the lessee of continuing said lease, providing the city does not require the land at the end of that time for any public purpose.

The report of the committee on quarantine, recommending certain sanitary regulations for the city, consideration of which was deferred at a former session of the Council, was taken up and read. After discussion on the propriety of enforcing some of the measures proposed, the report was laid upon the table.

The committee on finance, to whom was referred the subject of an increase in the salaries of two clerks employed in city offices, submitted a report, recommending that the matter be deferred until the beginning of another salary year. Adopted.

Adjourned for one week.

A Public Benefactor.—Our genial friend, J. W. Cooley, Esq., of Grantsville, is in town on business. Besides being a very agreeable person, Brother Cooley enjoys the reputation of being, to quite an extent, a public benefactor. For several years he has been engaged in constructing ditches, and his labors in this line have met with much success.

The first well he commenced, about four years ago, "struck water," and since then he has made quite a number of others. He is also acquainted with a new system of cultivating desert land, which he promises to make known to our readers in detail shortly. Under his treatment, a piece of barren land, where even grass refused to grow, has been brought to such a condition of fertility as to excel in powers of production some of the best land in Utah.

Last year he realized 85 bushels of wheat to the acre from it, and this season the yield promises to be even more abundant. The method of treatment that will produce such gratifying results is certainly one to be appreciated as a great blessing, and we hope Brother Cooley will send it in for publication as soon as possible.
