DAVID E. BROWNING DEAD.

David Elias Browning, an old and respected citizen of Ogden, died at his residence, of general delibility, incident to old age, Dec. 14, 1901. He was born h Davidson county, Tenn., January 19, 1892, Came to Illinois, with his parents, in his early boyhood, and removed, in 1852, to Utah, locating in Ogden, where he resided for nearly a half century. He was a gunsmith by trade, but in the early days of Ogden adapted himself to the various emergencies of frontier life, turning his ingenious hand to ma son and carpenter work, etc. He mar-ried, in 1853, Miss Charilla Abbott, (who has the honor of being the primitive schoolteacher of Ogden, then called Brownsville). He was the eldest son of the late Judge Jonathan Browning, was noted of his honesty and fair dealing with his felowman, leading a life of briety and frugality, generous and attached to friends, a general home-lov ing and upright citizen. His wife, three sons, Divid E., Jr., Stephen A. and Jonathan A. Browning; a son-in-law, McGregor and over a score of grandchildren survive him and mourn his departure.
