N. Y. Health Officer Takes Precautions to Prevent its Spread.

New York, July 26.-Health Officer Dety gave out the following statement this afternoon regarding the yellow fever situation at Colon and New Orafternoo

"Thave received no official notice that "Thave received no official notice that one or more cases of yellow fever were removed from the steamship Seguranca before her departure from Colon on July 22. If this disease is found on board when the vessel referred to reaches the New York quarantine sta-tion, the patient or patients will be re-moved to the Swinburne island hospital and all persons on board whose temand all persons on board whose tem-peratures are above the normal regis-ter will be removed to Hoffman Island for observation

The present regulations here are suf-"The present regulations here are suf-defent to furnish full protection. All vessels arriving from New Orleans are how subject to inspection at this sta-lon, and will be for the present treat-ed in the same manner as vessels ar-riving from Colon. There is no danger whatever that an outbreak of yellow fever in the northeast would be fol-lewed by any serious results to the public, principally for the reason that public, principally for the reason that the variety of the mosquito which transmits the disease is not found in this section of the country. Besides, the present treatment of an outbreak of this disease is simple and effective if properly carried out."
