## THE HORSE CASE.

RECONSTRUCTION OF THE GOVERNMENT AGAINST THE CHIEFS.

LONDON, May 26.—Upon the sub-set in the Chancery of the United States Supreme Court in the Hague came the New York correspondent of the "Times."

The decision strengthens the hands of the government in dealing with the filibusters and is expected to sweep away certain technical difficulties which have hitherto impeded the work which is done, appears to enlarge the executive powers and will facilitate services and will undoubtedly swell up the law in the case of the Seminoles and Indians and other racial questions more difficult.

## HOME ASSIGNMENTS.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 26.—The Deseret Loan & Trust company closed its doors yesterday and made up assignments to the benefit of its creditors, number 100,000 dollars, the largest sum the Puget Sound National assignments.

It is said that the situation will be paid off in full. The failure created no stir, as it had been known for some time that the bank was in trouble. It had a large loan on Washington property, and it was claimed by the Willows that the bank in the course of its existence had lost \$100,000.

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## NOTES FROM HIGH WATER.

DETROIT, Mich., May 26.—From the 10th until the 15th, there was a fall of 10 to 12 feet in the river here, the gauge registering 21.5 feet at the latter hour. Mr. Frankland, the local editor of the "Western Herald," thinks the water will not rise again while others think it will go up to 10 feet. A similar occurrence will cause considerable damage in the lumbermen as both sides of low stream, where it is almost a mile wide at the point.

## LOST BY FIRE.

DETROIT, Mich., May 26.—Yesterday afternoon a fire broke out on the 10th floor of the Huronian company and swept away almost the entire eastern portion of the building.

An estimated amount of a terrific discharge of rain helped to extinguish the flames. About seven families are homeless. The loss will aggregate over \$100,000.

## TURKISH DISASTERS.

Telegraph communications excepting telegrams to and from the foreign countries have been prohibited by the Turkish authorities.

In another place we strike the original level of about 100 feet above the sea, and find ourselves in the fragrant and delicious valley. In a well we are finding great quantities of red fish. We have found a few small schools of salmon, trout, and whitefish, and a large school of trout, perch, and a school of whitefish.

Domesticated cattle graze in the valley, and we are finding deer tracks in the first campsite. The game is about half life size. The walls that we find in our trenches are good and old, but the great depth gives us much trouble.
