At last my appointment came and I was sent to labor in the City of Ade-iade. about 1.200 miles southlaide, about 1,100 or 1,200 miles south-west of Sydney. In this city we held some good open air meetings, having very large attendance of from about

to 300 people. We had ma We had many investigators and many good friends. I can say that the Saints in this city are indeed workers, trying to bring their friends and rela-tives to a knowledge of the truth. Some of the best M. I.
