## PECULIAR QUALITY OF ORE.

#### Has Strong Phosphorescent Glow But Only Moderate Values.

Samples of ore possessing peculiar characteristics, although of no particu-lar value were a few days ago received for reduction by the Acme Mining Maachinery company from American Fork. The ore is probably a zinc sulphate and is exceedingly phosphorescent in the dark. It is highly sensitive and when rubbed together or brought in contact with steel it produces numerous sparks which scintilate much after the manr of electricity. While the find is not a discovery, the ore, is of unusual oc-currence. It is known in the rough parlance of the mining camp as "hell's dre" rock, and some years ago on Snake creek it is said that when a force of miners broke into a similar deposit, they were frightened away from work by the sparks generated by their picks.
