Mr. Perkins of California Holds That Domestic Sugar Industry Would Not Suffer.

MR. PATTERSON TAKES A HAND.

Declares That Four Out of Five Sen ators Who Vote for Measure Will Hold Their Noses.

Washington, Dec. 15 .- When the Cuban reciprocity bill was taken up in the senate toay Mr. Perkins of California spoke. He declared that the people of the United States had increased their sugar consumption six pounds a year per capita during the past eight years He maintained that the domestic sugar industry would not suffer by reason of the operation of the treaty as, should we buy the whole Cuban crop, it would only supply one-third of the amount needed.

Cuba, he said, had abandoned the cultivation of citrus fruits on account of the vast success of this crop in Callfornia and Florida.

Mr. Simmons (N. C.) explained that

fornia and Florida. Mr. Simmons (N. C.) explained that he had voted for the treaty and would vote for the bill. The bill contained some provisions he would like to have amended, but he realized, he said, the time for such changes was when the treaty was under consideration. Mr. McCumber (N. D.) ridiculed the statements of friends of the measure that its passage was the payment of a debt, and said such expressions were mistaken ideas of philanthropy. On the contrary, said Mr. McCumber, Cuba for years had tugged at the tether which bound her to Spanish aggression and when we cut those bonds it was not understood that we should bear the expenses of making Cubans pros-perous and hapy. Mr. Patterson (Colo.) took up a col-loquy which occurred yesterday be-tween Senators Teller (Colo.) and Lodge (Mass.), concerning the laws of Cuba governing immigration of Chinese into the island. Mr. Lodge had attempt-ed to show that the Chinese exclusion act of this country was in force in Cuba. Mr. Patterson antagonized the statement and read reports and orders issued by the war department and later-macted into law in Cuba and other data to support the position which had been taken by his colleague. Mr. Patterson predicted a vast in-flux of Chinese into Cuba and declared the Republican Congress to be the mouthplece for the influences which threaten to destroy the beet sugar in-dustry. He found the inspiration of this

mouthpiece for the influences which threaten to destroy the beet sugar in-dustry. He found the inspiration of this course in the sugar irrust which he ac-cused of invading the sugar supply. Mr. Patterson was proceeding to say that he would be willing to have the tariff on sugar reduced if there could be a corresponding reduction in other arti-cles of import, when Mr. Aldrich inter-rupted him to ask if he was willing to make advolorem rates on sugar as on other articles. other articles.

Mr. Patterson replied that he was willing to take the present tariff as a basis, and he asked Mr .Aldrich if he considered the tariff equitable. The Rhode Island senator replied that he considered the tariff too high, and when Mr. Patterson was about to congratu-late himself upon this admission, Mr. Aldrich exclaimed that he had refer-Addrich exclaimed that he had refer-ence to the duty on sugar. Mr. Patterson proceeded to say that he was willing to place himself upon the platform of Thomas Jefferson on the protection of American industries, but in reply to a question from Mr. Al-drich as to whether a Democratic cau-cus would enderso the a describe he drich as to whether a Democratic cau-cus would endorse that doctrine, he said that the Democratic party is not a free trade party, but is for incidental pro-tection. The Democratic party was not alone, said Mr. Patterson, in not being a unit. It had not been so long since the Republican governor of Jowa had come to Washington and, after a visit to the White House, had returned to Jowa and allowed Mr. Allison, the senior senator from that state, to write the party platform for him. schlor senator from that state, to write the party platform for him. Mr. Dolliver interrupted to say that there had been nothing to indicate that Gov. Cummins had surrendered any of his tariff views and, he added, "The results of the late election show that he has not surrendered any of his uncortises." majorities. Majorities." Mr. Patterson declared that four out of five senators would hold their noses while voting for this bill, and that many of them would cast their votes against it if they could break away from the influences of the White House. Maj. Runcie Reiterates His Statement That the General Knew of it

Washington, Dec. 15 .- In the Gen. Wood case today Maj, J. E. Runcie was the first witness. Statements made by Ray Stannard Baker concerning the article reflecting upon the administration of Maj.-Gen. Brooke, made it necessary for the recall of Maj. Runcie. He was asked a number of questions concerning the origin of the article in question and stood by his former testimony to the effect that Gen. Wood had knowl-

edge of the story, and that it was pre-pared practically at his suggestion and dictation. The next witness was George R. Bur-The next withess was George R. Bur-ton, inspector-general of the army. He occupied the position of inspector-gen-eral in Cuba under the administration of Gen. Wood as governor-general, and it was he who discovered the postal fraude

frauds. frauds, He was called for the purpose of tell-ing the date that Gen. Wood made the order revising the judicial system of Cuba for the admission of ex-parte tes-timony. Gen. Burton said that the discovery of the postal frauds was made in April, 1900, and that it was two weeks or more later when the or-der was issued by Gen.
