Sacramento Extends Welcome To Vice Prest. Fairbanks, Gov. Cutler and Others.

UTAH WELL REPRESENTED.

Two Hundred Delegates Present-The Orden Choir Will Be a Big Feature.

Sacramento, Cal., Sept 1 .- The city today extends a hearty welcome to Vice-President of the United States Charles W. Fairbanks, Gov. Albert E. Mend of Washington, Gov. J. C. Cutler of Utah and hundreds of delegates to the fifteenth National Irrigation congress. Elaborate preparations were made to receive the distinguished visitors and provide for their comfort during their stay here. Interest centered principally in the arrival of Vice President Fairbanks, who came from Stockton, reaching here at 7 o'clock this evening. He was accompanied by Gov. J. N. Gillett and a committee that went to Stockton to meet him. A ralute of 19 guns was fired when his train arrived.

ratute of 10 guns was fired when his train arrived. Utah is represented by about 200 delegates. The Ogden tabernacle choir, which will be a big feature of the con-gress, arrived at 3 o'clock in the after-noon, and this evening rehearsed the "Irrigation Ode." which will mark the opening of the convention tomotrow. Many of the singers are delegates. Gov. Meade arrived sarly this morn-trig, accompanied by the Washington delegation from Olympia, and other cities. Early tomorrow morning Gov. Chamberiain of Oregon, president of the irrigation congress, will arrive, and later Gov. Kibbey of Arizona will be here. Gov. Sparks of Nevada, sent word that he will arrive from Polo Alto within a day or so. Including Gov. Callett there will be six state executives on hand.

on hand. Tomorrow will be a gala occasion in this city, as it will be marked by the Labor day celebration and the opening of the irrigation congress, the inter-state exposition and the state fair. Gifford Pinchot, chief forester, was among the arrivals today. He will de-liver the message of President Rosse-velt to the congress.

CZAR NICHOLAS ATTENDS CONSECRATION OF CHURCH

St. ePtersburg, Sept. 1.—For the sec-ond time since Red Sunday Emperor Nichoias today entered the capital to attend the consecration of a church to the memory of his grandfather, Alex-mader II, who was assassinated in March, 1851, on the spot where the edi-foc was raised. The date of the trip, coincident with the conspiracy triad inst closed here, plainly was designed to raise the loyality of the army and the people. It was a complete surprise, and no 'untoward incident occurred. The police neglected no precaution to



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insure the safety of the emperor, and even went so far as to thoroughly search the city and inspect the pass-ports of suspicious individuals. Gen-darmes were stationed at every window darmes were stationed at every window facing the routes over which the im-perial families passed, and owners of houses were forbidden to open windows under pain of fine, Bridge and river traffic was entirely suspended, the banks of the Neva were lined with marine guards and torpedo boats pa-trolled the river. The imperial party arrived from Peterhoff unannounced, not a single salute being fired during their whole stay.

not a single salute being fired during their whole stay. The emperor was in excellent spirits, but the empross had the same care-worn, sad look that has been remarked so oftee. The emperor wore a simple uniform with a dark blue tunic. The empress was gowned in white slik and wore a white ostrich feather in her hat and a string of diamonds. Both their majesties remained standing throughout the entire ceremony, which lasted three and a quarter hours. After the ceremony the imperial party left for a eruise on the Gulf of Finland.
