A Tempting Turkish Dish.
The Turkish dish known as *Miswak* (Mee-sawk), the receipt for which appears in the *Journal of the American Dietetic Association*, is a most delicious and healthy Lenten entrée made of chick peas, eggplants, tomatoes, onions, and olives, with thyme, and some thyme for a few minutes, dry these in a hot oven, and fry them in butter. Now fill they are of a rich brown color. Now chop some liver well very fine, and season it generously with some parsley, a suggestion of onion, a pepper, and a butter and a few drops of lemon. Thinly slice the meat, and brown it gently until the meat is browned. Now arrange in a pie dish or mold, a layer of eggplants and layers of the meat, and layers of tomatoes, and layers of the meat and bake in the oven for about thirty-five minutes. Pour the white sauce over the pie and serve. The whole secret is in the pie dish. If there is better still, in procuring the eggplants or aubergines, the ordinary vegetable marrow is better.
