ALBANY, 22.—Rumors are in cir-

culation here of the disappearance

of important records from the office

NEW YORK, 22.—It is said that an-

other call for the redemption of the

U.S. 5-20's of 1862 will be made next

week by the Secretary of the Treas-

ury, for about fourteen millions,

which will extinguish the whole

loan of '62.

A summary of the losses of the

Fire Insurance Companies for six

months of this year shows an ag-

gregate of more than all the losses

of 1874. The losses this year have

fallen not on the great cities, but

chiefly on country towns, on the

property destroyed in which the

companies have paid about twenty-

five million dollars.
