# **NEW GYMANSIUM** AND SCRUB TEAM.

These Two Elements Epected to Work for Utah Victories Next Year.

MADDOCK IS VERY HOPEFUL.

Says Lack of Them This Year Was Great Handleap on Varsity Eleven And it Was Overworked.

People who look for the 'varsity to continue much longer on the slump which cost it two defeats this season, are to receive a rade awakening when the team plays an opponent once again, and when the season closes Thanksgiving day with a game with the Colorado Aggies the eleven will probably be playing the oldtime winning ball, that once would have defeated Boulder and Golden with grace

This is the outlook, now that the severe Denver game, which crippled the team s badly is retiring into the distance and the men are getting a chance to recover their form after the hard games against great odds played during the last two weeks. OUTLOOK NOT BAD.

"Next year," said Coach Maddock today, "I feet that the team will be in
condition to start on a permanent basis
of winning games. We will have a gym
by then, and the men are beginning to
learn that they can't expect to make football men in a week or two, and are staying with the proposition."

This little announcement will, perhaps,
mean more in solving the football situation at the University, than any other
made in recent days. Just now there are
many theories advanced to account for
Utah's defeat in the last two games, and
the advisory board, the athletic coundl, the students, the regents the faculty,
and the coach are all being closely serutinized in search of underlying causes for
the situation.

GYMNASIUM WILL HELP.

But after all is said, the fact remains that Utah turned out too small a squad, that the lack of accommodations made it liftleaft to care for suits, and the path of the scrub was thus made unincressarily sard. With the completion of a gymnasium where uniforms may be cared for properly and each fellow may be assured it is in his locker, and the extention of the coaching system over the entire scrub squad so that the second line of reserves will always be strong, the football situation will solve itself. As Madiock put it this morning, "The University will begin on a permantent basis to make winning teams." This at least is the view of many of the men most closely in touch with the situation.

The men of the team appreciate as few outsiders do, the difficulties of this season, which led to playing the biggest sames of the year with a crippled team. In the first place the men who are now ikely candidates did not come out. Then, when the 'varsity line was made up, and t was apparent how light it was going o be, the call for recruits became descrete, but not until the Boulder defeat hid the men shop up who could have remedied it. The hard Denver game wore he team out, and by retiring Barton exposed a great many weak spots which Maddock had carefully distributed over he team so as to be the least dangerous. The loss of Earton was as if a gap had seen made in a fence, and all manner of cores fell through the weak places thus ancovered.

SCRUES SOLVING PROBLEM.

If the scrub squad had been in condi-ion to fill in men for the Denver game, ifter the veterans began to tire, the sit-istion would have been improved, as they ould then have been saved in good con-tition to bear the hardest brunt of the sext struggle. But it was not so, and this sone big difference promised for next

"We want the old players hack." said Maddock, "to help coach men for their positions, and we want to go to work from now on on the scrub team and bring tup to a good state of general football mowledge. We have never had much of a scrub team before, but now that we have got it, it's up to us to make the most of it. In the next game every man who shows any form at all, will be given a chance to play before it is over, and get a taste of the game under fire. I hink conditions are getting better all stong, and we are profiting by the legsors of this year."

living he forgets everything else in his
enthusiasm. He has health on his side
and he desires to make muscle, thinking
that it will accelerate matters in his
march to the top of the ladder.
"He enters the gymnasium early in the
morning and plods away for hours. He
perspires, he grows weary, rests and receiperates and repeats the entire program. I've keeps this up for weeks and
weeks, His heart action is quickened and
an extra strain is put on this organ.

an extra strain is put on this organ which in the end must collapse. He watches his muscles grow. Some may have widened a few inches and he is de-ighted.

have widened a few inches and he is delighted.

"Weight comes off, perhaps slowly at first, but in the end he grows thin. His strength suddenly deserts him, his legs give way, his arms are heavy and weak. That is his first warning.

"His trainers cheer him up by saying that he has indigestion and that it will soon pass away. The truth is the exercise has run his system down. All these things tell in future years and at the time the fighter should be at his best he is on the downward path."

It was Madden who revived interest in boxing in America by having Sullivan tour the country meeting all comers in four-round bouts. He has been a trainer and manager for twenty-five years, and was a puglist himself for ten years. This man who knows says:






