



south of the Lincoln House annex. The building will be fireproof of pressed red brick and stone, with ornamentations in cement, with 70 feet front, and 135 feet in depth, the rear facing on Plum alley. The height in the clear will be 60 freet. The scating capacity of the theater is to be 1,500 people-850 on the ground floor, and 650 in the balcony, with standing room for 100 more. The cost of the structure is put at \$35,000. A feature will be the separation of the stage, auditorium and the front, which includes the lobby and the store apartment, thus dividing the building into three independent structures. The stage is to be 40 feet deep and 68 feet wide, and is to be provided with a steel-asbestos curiain. The stage will have six large and two small dressing rooms on the right hand side, with property rooms on the left. There are to be four proscenium boxes on the ground floor, and four boxes in the balcony. In the front of the house, the proprietors have decided to locate a store on the ground floor, with the vestibule and large lobby. The ticket office will be located inside the lobby.

A special feature of the house will be the automatic skylight over the stage, through which any fire that may be started on the stage will find ready vent, and there will be several special fire escapes from the parquet and balcony. Active construction will begin at once. The elevation as given above has been adopted as far as the front above the ground floor is concerned. The elevation of the ground floor in the printed plan will be readapted to acommodate the stores. C. M. Neuhausen is the architect.

Pugifistic Career. Jabez White, the lightweight champion of England, is perhaps one of the most popular men today, as far as boxing cir-cles are concerned. White was born in Birmingham in 1876 but not of fighting stock. Jabez's father being a jeweler **31d** a very keen sports. man, White would pass for a well-dressed bank clerk, his quiet-looking face having none of the boxer's tradesmark about it.

He is five feet eight inches high and commenced boxing in 1884, when little over six stone (eighty-four pounds) in weight. His first appearance was made at a tournament at London, when he do-feated Ted Marlow in six and George Edge in three rounds.
