



THE PROPOSED NEW ORPHEUM THEATER TO BE BUILT ON STATE STREET.

The proposed Orpheum theater is to be located on State street at the south corner of Commercial avenue, just south of the Lincoln House annex. The building will be fireproof of pressed red brick and stone, with ornamental details in cement, with 70 feet front, and 135 feet in depth, the rear facing on Plum alley. The height in the clear will be 60 feet. The seating capacity of the theater is to be 1,500 people—850 on the ground floor, and 650 in the balcony, with standing room for 100 more. The cost of the structure is put at \$35,000. A feature will be the separation of the stage, auditorium and the front, which includes the lobby and the store apartment, thus dividing the building into three independent structures. The stage is to be 40 feet deep and 65 feet wide, and is to be provided with a steel-ash-brest curtain. The stage will have six large and two small dressing rooms on the right hand side, with property rooms on the left. There are to be four proscenium boxes on the ground floor, and four boxes in the balcony. In the front of the house, the proprietors have decided to locate a store on the ground floor, with the vestibule and large lobby. The ticket office will be located inside the lobby.

A special feature of the house will be the automatic skylight over the stage, through which any fire that may be started on the stage will find ready vent, and there will be several special fire escapes from the parquet and balcony. Active construction will begin at once. The elevation as given above has been adopted as far as the front above the ground floor is concerned. The elevation of the ground floor in the printed plan will be readapted to accommodate the stores. C. M. Neuhausen is the architect.

"I expect to have the plans by the early part of next week and will start the carpenters to work the day they are received. Work will be rushed to complete the track at as early a date as possible, so we will be ready for racing as soon as the weather permits. I believe the game will be well patronized in Ogden and that the Junction city will soon become as great a bicycle center as Salt Lake is now."

GETTING READY FOR BIKE RACES

Schelski Appoints Frank Gardner Official Referee for N. C. A.

HEAGREN IS WORKING HARD.

He Will Most Likely Have Charge Of Salt Lake and Ogden Race Tracks This Season.

Those interested in the bicycle racing game evidently believe in making an early start for the opening of the season, and preparations are now going on for the opening meet.

As the situation now stands in this city and in Ogden it looks as if Harry Heagren, last year's manager of the Salt Palace track, will have charge of both courses this season. He is working hard to get the Ogden track rushed through, and to have the local saucer put in good condition. Heagren is in communication with a score or more of crack eastern riders, and just as soon as the weather permits the races will begin.

This morning Representative Schelski of the N. C. A. announced the appointment of Frank Gardner as official referee, with R. L. Conley and Frank L. Hart as associates. Dr. Fred Meakin will very likely act as announcer. The names of the judges and scorers will be announced later.

It is understood that the plans for the Ogden track have been completed, and that within a few days contracts will be let and work started on the track. It will be built at Glenwood park, and arrangements have been made with the street car company for a fare of five cents round trip to the races.

Excursions will be run from Salt Lake to Ogden with a fare of \$1 for the round trip. For \$1.25 one may go to Ogden, see the races and leaving Ogden at 11 p. m., return to Salt Lake. The train will leave here at 4:30 p. m.

From the present outlook it is safe to say that this season's racing will be the heat in the history of the sport in Utah. The four race meets each week with purses aggregating \$1,000, certainly should prove a big drawing card among eastern riders, and Manager Heagren is assured of a big list of speedy ones.

BASEBALL WITHOUT BUTTE.

That is What It Means Since That City Has Decided to Stay Out.

Well, Butte will not be with us this season, but we will probably be able to put along in some kind of a way. Not out of the question. The committee having the matter in charge, held a meeting last night and concluded not to go into the Pacific National league, and now the league will have to worry along as best it can.

But Ogden is all right, and reports from that city are to the effect that the fans want to get into the league, and that players are being corralled as rapidly as possible to form the team for this season.

The same applies to Salt Lake. Manager Kelly is getting extremely busy these days. Last night he telegraphed to 14 ball players and sent them transportation with an order to hustle up and get out here as fast as steam can bring them. He would not give out their names, but said he would do so as fast as the men arrived.

He is anxious to get the men here soon because two games with the Chicago Nationals are scheduled for April 1 and 2.

ABOUT JABEZ WHITE.

When the English Champion Hogan His Pugilistic Career.

Jabez White, the lightweight champion of England, perhaps one of the most popular men today, as far as boxing circles are concerned. White was born in Birmingham in 1874, but not of fighting stock. Jabez's father being a jeweler and a very keen sportsman, White would pass for a well-dressed bank clerk, his quiet-looking face having none of the boxer's trademark about it.

He is five feet eight inches high and commenced boxing in 1894, when little over six stone (eighty-four pounds) in weight. His first appearance was made at a tournament at London, when he defeated Red Marlow in six and George Edge in three rounds. White sealed with within the bantam limit. He then met and defeated Charlie Black, but in the final was outpointed in an extra round by Ted Beach, the latter being awarded the tournament trophy.

In May, 1895, White practiced, and about twelve months later (October, 1895), at another tournament held in London, after defeating Con Barrett and Bill Parsons, lost to Sid Seales on points.

On the opening of the Olympic club, Birmingham, White met and defeated Charlie Tongue, but lost to Charlie Simpson in ten rounds. In a return match with the latter for a purse of \$250 at the Olympic club, White won easily in six rounds. Jabez's next customer was a Birmingham boxer named Harvey Cheek, who he met for a purse of \$375. He knocked out his opponent in the eighth round. He also knocked out Ben Foster in two rounds, and then flew at higher game, when he met George Goodell of Sheffield at London hall, Birmingham, and won by a decision in ten rounds. In September, 1897, 1750 depending on the result. He knocked out Goodell (who had made a fight of it) against Billy Primmer) in the fifth round.

After defeating Dick Higgins in four rounds, he was matched to box Mike Sears of Boston, Mass., twenty rounds at 122 pounds before the London National Sporting club. White being declared the winner in the twelfth round, when Sears was all but out.

His next customers were Dave Newell, whom he defeated in nine rounds, and Dave Wallace in eight.

White's match with Ben Jordan, the holder of the English featherweight title, fell through by reason of the former having taken on weight and could not make the specified limit. He, however, did not remain idle long, and signed to box Harry Greenfield before the London National Sporting club for \$500 a side and a national purse. White stopped his opponent in the eighth round with a body punch. He then easily knocked out Billy Chester at the National in nine rounds, while he beat "Snake" Sullivan twice on points at the same club. A proposed match with Eddie Connolly of America then fell through, and then came a reversal at the hands of Will Curlew. Greenfield, who has also boxed a twenty-round draw with Jim Curran at Birmingham, though the majority of the spectators at this match thought White ought to have had the decision.

The English champion runs the "Fox and Grapes" inn close to Birmingham, is handsomely married and is the father of an embryo champion.

ANDERSON'S NEW DISCOVERY.

Learns How to Hit the Ball With an "English" to It.

John Anderson, one of the Yankees' heavy hitters, now commands the attention of all baseball fans. He claims to have discovered a new way to swing the bat that will fool the fields just as effectively as Chebro deceives the batter with his spit-ball. The "Tangent" he calls it.

Anderson declares he has developed a method of putting an "English" on a ball when he hits it that will cause it to deflect from its true course in a similar manner to a ball that has been "Englished" by a player.

Just how he twists the bat to accomplish this Anderson refuses to divulge. He is practicing the new stunt daily, and believes he will have it down to a fine art before the season is under way.

The advantages of the trick if he gains control of it are manifest. It will turn many a fly or certain out as a safe hit. After he slams the sphere to the baseman or fielders will run in the direction it is taking to be ready to receive it, only to see it curve sharply and get by them. Anderson claims he can make it shift either to the right or left.
