

## NOVELTIES FOR HOLIDAY SEASON.

Jobbers are Rushed to Death  
And Will Continue So Till  
After Christmas.

DOLLS AND SLEDS IN DEMAND.

Tree Trimmings, Imitation Fruits  
and Mechanical Toys Also Find  
Ready Market.

Jobbers in Christmas novelties report being "rushed to death," notwithstanding it is so near the holidays; and they claim they will not be free from business pressure until after the holidays are over. Retailers, both in this city, and out in the state, are still heavily buying, so that there seems to be no end to the calls.

Dolls, as usual, are the big feature in the Christmas trade, and range in prices up to \$10. They seem to be made this year of better material and with more care in detail than customary, and the use of celluloid in making up the body makes them much lighter in weight, though not any less inflammable. Ground cork is being used for their "dear little insides." A phenomenal sale is reported of dressed dolls. There is also an unusual sale of Christmas tree trimmings, which seem to be in an endless variety, and there will be more Christmas bells sold this season because the prices have dropped so materially. These bells are made of different colored papers, and such as sold last year for \$2, now are selling at 25 cents, and bells that sold for half a dollar, now are going at a nickel.

### RUSH FOR SLEDS.

There is a big rush for sleds, which is accelerated by the last snow storm. In fact, the market is being raised so that dealers say there will be none left shortly. So hurry up and buy sleds, or prepare to get left. On the contrary, Christmas books are finding a slow sale, and country merchants are purchasing fewer books than ever. They say that they can get books at any time, but other things pertaining to the season they can not get. Jobbers say they are buying \$250 worth of goods, are expending not over \$15 of this in books. They prefer to buy toys.

### OTHER NOVELTIES.

Imitation fruits are selling as Christmas novelties, so that these are no longer confined to women's hats. Grapes, apples and bananas are the favorite kinds of fruit copied after. A car load of French late picture glass was received this week, 450 boxes, to be made up for Christmas, and the duty on the same was \$200. Jobbers say games are always good for Christmas, and particularly the game of Block is now becoming so popular that it is claimed to be running whist out of fashion wherever it goes.

### TOYS ARE ACTIVE.

The demand for mechanical toys continues stronger than ever, but it is noted that the German manufacturers far outdo the American makers in this respect—and in this line there are more novelties than ever. Among the latter is the walking toy cart that is wound up, and pulled by a man or donkey who walks as in life, the merry-go-round, the loop-the-loop, etc. The American toy manufacturer seems to turn his attention to bulkier goods, especially in the line of iron and tin toys. "Contra the loop," etc. is a good and steady sale of garden toys, even at this time of year, and there is also a big sale of rubber goods.

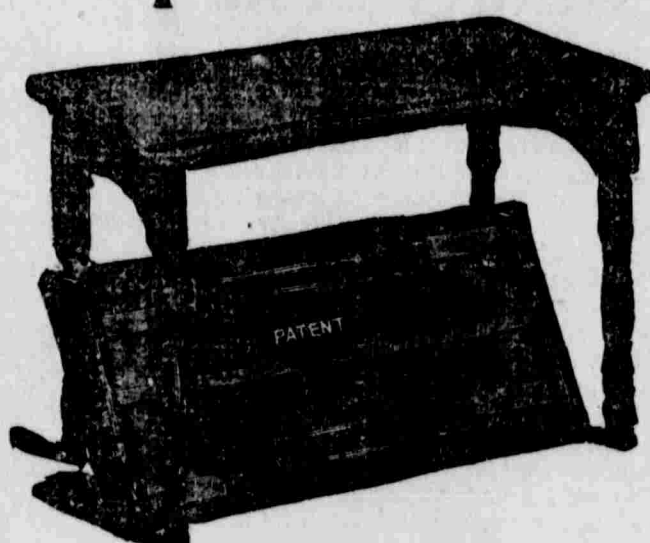
