PUT IN A STRENUOUS DAY.

Good Card of Bicycle Races at Saucer

There were several interesting athletic events at Lagoon yesterday afternoon. In addition to the high school cadets, an army of children from the school for the deaf, dumb and blind were in attendance. The center of attraction was Bob Fitzsimmons and his pet lion "Senator." In this connection there was a touching incident that brought tears to the eyes of Captain Thomas Johnson, the Lagoon policeman, and Fitzsimmons.

Two little boys, one of them partly blind, was observed leading his little brother, totally blind, up to the big lion. The elder of the two was trying to describe the lion to the little blind fellow, and was endeavoring to get him to put his hand on the lion's head. The blind child appeared to be afraid until Captain Johnson picked the little fellow up and took him to the lion, placing his hand on his head. In speaking about the incident, which was witnessed by Fitz, Johnson said: "To see that little blind boy patting the huge, heavy, simply brought tears to my eyes."

Fitz remarked to some friends standing by: "I'll tell you, I've never seen a boy knocked out by a lion in my time. But to see that little blind child trying to learn something about the lion, and the feeling of him, simply knocked out the old man. He didn't know there was any blind children out here, and to see the fact of it."

In the morning Fitz took the lion to the top of the mountain and upon his return he clipped Senator's toe-nails—and was a merry row as a result. "Senator" did not take kindly to the operation and suddenly struck Fitz in the solar plexus. The red-topped warrior went down in a heap. Fitz said to the "News" sporting editor: "That's where I'll get it, isn't it? That's where I'll get it, isn't it?"

Fitz has his training quarters completed, and is living in a comfortable, well-ventilated, Senator, and the dog Bob.

There was a change of business all around with the ball teams in the P. N. L. league yesterday afternoon. Salt Lake has gone to Boise, where a series of five games will be opened tomorrow afternoon. BIKE RACES AT OGDEN.

N. C. Hopper Displayed His Usual Good Form and Won Big Event.

The bicycle races at Ogden last night were well attended, and the crowd saw some pretty fast going.

N. C. Hopper displayed his usual good form and carried off the honors in the principal event. In the half-mile mile open, against a fast field of pros, Hopper kicked over the tape a winner, beating the distance in 1:10.4. Hopper got second and Downing third. Ed Smith won the mile handicap from the amateur crowd. McMahon took first in the five-mile open race. The summary follows:
