The Railroad.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—A Million Evans, of Walla Walla, Washington Territory, complains to the Interstate Commerce Commission of the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company for charging \$100 per 100 pounds on wheat from Walla Walla to Portland, which rate he thinks an extortion.

The Secretary of the Interior has received an answer from all the land grant railroads in the United States, dated May 23d, requiring them to show cause why the several orders of withdrawal from settlement of lands within their indemnity limits should not be revoked and the lands embraced therein restored.

TO SETTLEMENT.

The Atlantic & Pacific Company claims it has not failed to give ample notice of its indemnity right, and claims that the notice heretofore given already shows that by the past and present selection of all the lands within its available limits, it has not, as charged, been guilty of fraud.

The grant, as earned, is deficient more than one million acres; that the contract between the United States and the Atlantic & Pacific Company would be seriously violated, if, with the knowledge of the government, the rights of the existing indemnity with drawal is made or other action taken tending to diminish or cloud the rights of the company therein, that delay in

THE SELECTION

has arisen from the failure of the United States to make a survey of the granted and indemnity lands, as to certain and settle the boundaries of the pending small land claims with such certainty that the preference of the loss therein can be determined; to permit settlers prior in time to the railroad grant to make a known claim by proper description and finally by the affirmative action of the Indian and other reservations within the railroad grant and enlarging others heretofore created, and his refusal to permit survey to be made on the company's deposit of the cost thereon.

With the understanding these difficulties, the company states it has done all things possible to

IDENTIFY ITS LOSSES,

make its selections, and submit that neither law, equity nor good conscience require the existing withdrawal to be rescinded.

The Oregon & California Railroad Company, in its answer, represents that the whole number of the odd sections contained within the indemnity limits of the company will be 282,000 acres, short of compensating it for its lands lost in place, and as the larger portion of these lands have never been surveyed, so as to render it possible for the company to make its selection of such lands, it contends that it would be a manifest injustice if the existing orders of withdrawal should be now revoked.

THE RIVER TROUBLE.

OTTAWA, June 27.—The action of the government of Manitoba on the proposed Red River Railway is beginning to attract the attention of prominent Manitobans. It is stated that the Dominion government will prevent this construction of the road at all hazards.

Criminal Cases.

NEW ORLEANS, June 27.—A special from GIPRA, Louisiana, says: A riot occurred at Oak Ridge, Louisiana, in which one white man and six negroes were killed and several white men were dangerously wounded. Yesterday evening a white man and a negro were taken from the calaboose and were fired upon by Jerry Baldwin, his two sons, and three other negroes, wounding Deputy Baker and Gardner. The negroes then dispersed and the latter was rescued at a negro cabin two miles from town. On learning their whereabouts the officers went to arrest them. On their way back the cabin they were fired upon and one of their number, G. W. Higginbotham, was

INSTANTLY KILLED

and Constable John Conger, Gardner and Baker, dangerously wounded. During the melee which followed Jerry Baldwin and one of his sons and four other negroes were killed. Everything is now quiet. Twenty men from Bastrop have arrived there. Town Marshal John Conger, who brought the news, said he would prevent the House of Lords keeping the set on the statute book in defiance of the House of Commons.

LONDON, June 27.—It is announced that Ovid's tomb has been discovered. The location is at Anarokli, near Kustendami. The stone marking the tomb was discovered by a local man, who was a descendant of the Ovid family. The tomb was found in a cave, and was in a very good state of preservation.

PARIS, June 27.—President Gregg's nephew, Leon, was married to Louise, daughter of Senator Labiche, at the church of the Madeleine to-day.

Nihilists at Work.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 27.—The nihilists, according to the police authorities here, have resumed active work, collecting money for their purposes and spreading pamphlets broadcast.

Irish Meeting.

CHICAGO, June 27.—At a meeting of the board of directors of the American Republics Bank to-day, President Irwin tendered his resignation, and was elected to fill the place. The board of directors of the bank, which was organized in 1885, has been in session since the resignation of President Irwin.

Pneumonia and Typhoid.

A correspondent of the Baltimore Sunday News says in regard to pneumonia: If you will permit me, I will give an unprofessional remedy, or means of cure by which nine cases out of ten can be relieved in less than 24 hours, and cured in less than three days. Give some warm stimulating tea to help contract the cold, or as soon as possible a poultice of hot onions to the chest and renew the application frequently until the fever is obtained. The poultice should be mashed and heated with a little lard in a vessel suitable for it, or take some life everlasting if it cannot be had, any common herbs may answer; boil it with vinegar and make a mask with cornmeal. Apply a poultice of this as hot as it can be borne upon the chest, and repeat the treatment at short intervals. The congestion will soon be relieved, the pain will cease, the blood will flow freely in the congested channels, and the patient will be out of danger in 24 hours. I would advise you to give the same value as a poultice of equal parts of cream of tartar and aloes. Some pills, which the family may have been accustomed to use may answer just as well. The simple thing is to assist nature to throw off disease. The same treatment will cure typhoid fever, but I know of many cases having been made by simply putting mashed raw onions to the chest at first. In high stages of the fever they will soon turn out several applications generally give relief. Typhoid fever, however, is a very few leaves reported in our city from pneumonia or typhoid fever.
