JIM LEARY TO FRAME WILD WEST CARNIVAL

Grand Army Veterans Will be Given
A Peep at Alkali Ike Show.

Upon James C. Leary will devolve the
task of providing a wild west enter-
tainment during the coming G. A. R.
encampment. He is already busy in
negotiating for the most startling and
best that can be obtained in that line,
including "broncho busting" from the
wildest parts of the wild. Says Mr.
Leary:

"I am planning to make this one of
the occasions of the year, a sort of
cross between the Cheyenne frontier
and the Denver Festival of Mountain
and Plain. We are going to have
all the Cheyenne features, combined
with local attractions, and it is going
to be the one big time of the year.
"In addition to broncho busting, there
will be of course rope pulling and tieing
contests. In fact, all of the items neces-
sary to show what life in the west was
during the old cattle days.
"It is probable that, should this prove
the success I expect it to be, the com-
mercial organizations of the city and
state will arrange for it to become an
established yearly feature. That is, of
course, in the future, but there will be
nothing left undone to make this
year's occasion a full success. All
sorts of stock is available, and I be-
lieve the fair grounds will prove an
ideal place at which to give the show."

ENLARGING COAL YARDS.
The Bamberger Coal company has
bought 5 by 20 rods north of the com-
pany's coal yard No. 1, corner of
Second South and Fifth West streets,
for \$7,500, from E. N. McCormick.
This is the first step in a move to en-
large the company's business, and will
require an outlay of \$25,000, and in-
cludes erection of several fair sized
buildings, stables, storage sheds, etc.
It is the intention to lay in a large
supply of coal during the summer,
in provision against possible coal
famines. Ten new coal wagons are to
be obtained, 10 new teams of horses,
and other equipment.
