Loans State \$50,000—The state board of land commissioners yesterday made a loan of \$50,000 to the state to pay the general running expenses until the taxes come in this fall. The board gets 4 per cent interest on the money and may call the loan in any time it can use the money to better advantage.

NEW DIRECTORY OUT. Big Growth in Population of Salt Lake Shown in Latest Issue.

Longer through in the width and bigger and brighter throughout is the Salt Lake City directory for 1907 compiled and published by R. L. Polk & Company. In the introductory comments upon the increase of population and general growth of the city W. E. Cooper, secretary and manager of the publishing company, says: "The estimate of population made from a directory canvass by this company is regarded as being correct. There are in the volume 53,561 individual names, (names of corporations, firms, death and removal notices not included) and have been used in the lowest multiple in vogue in western cities, 24, in making our estimates of population, since 1905 but owing to the very close canvass made this year, on an account of the large number of names of single men working at the Murray and Garfield smelters and included in this volume we have decided to use the multiple of 2. This year to represent the married women and children who are not included in the directory canvass. This indicates a population of 105,122 residing within the limits covered by our canvasses."
