## PASTURAGE COMES HIGH.

Bingham Junction Butcher Trails Sheep Over Reserve and Pays \$25.

T. J. Dahl, a Bingham Junction butcher, paid an involuntary assessment of \$25 for having caused 119 head of sheep to cross through Mill Creek canyon, over the Salt Lake forest range. The sheep were purchased at Park City, and the owner took the risk of driving the animals to their destination by the shortest route, which is a narrow and rough-fact. The fact that the mutton had been on the reserve soon became apparent, and Supervisor E. H. Clark had little difficulty in tracing the ownership. Mr. Dahl was given the alternative of paying 25 cents per head for the pasture the sheep had had, or to face a charge of trespass and a fine reserve. He chose the first way out of the difficulty and paid the money.

Layton Citizens Ask for Protection from Oregon Short Line Limited Trains.

## RESOLUTIONS ARE PRESENTED

Giving Railroad Company Twenty-four Hours to Place a Flagman on the Fatal Crossing.

As a result of the railroad accident at Layton Monday in which Roy Sessions of Syracuse lost his life and Leo Sandall escaped, only by a miracle, a committee from Layton has waited on Superintendent Buckingham of the Oregon Short Line. A promise was obtained that a watchman would be kept on the dangerous crossing during the carnival being held in Layton this week. Mr. Buckingham said further that this he could do nothing until Mr. Bancroft, vice-president and general manager of the Oregon Short Line arrives from a trip out of town.

THE COMMITTEE. The committee which waited upon the railway official consisted of Joseph M. Smith, William N. Salder and Joseph Mabey Jr. They carried the demands of Layton and residents of surrounding territory almost in their entirety. They explained that Monday's accident, while wholly unnecessary, was inevitable as things are arranged now. The trucks make a bend in passing the depot, while a person driving at right angles with the tracks can see the train some distance above or below the depot they see it coming from the rear. The committee, however, insistively whip forward to get across the tracks. They manage to reach the tracks just about the same instant the train dashes over the crossing. When Mr. Smith explained that a carnival was to be held this week Mr. Buckingham said he would guarantee a watchman for the treacherous crossing.

ONLY TEMPORARILY. "But I can't promise a watchman to stay on duty until the depot is moved or a gang installed," is the way he is quoted by the committee members. Just as soon as the depot is taken care of, another meeting will be held in Layton, says the committee, and more indignation turned loose.

The identical crossing that cost Mr. Sessions his life is the only one where a train dashed into a buggy killing four members of the Kershaw family. This case was compromised a few days ago for \$4,500. Before the settlement, the railroad standards for the crossing alarm gongs were on the depot platform. They laid there for a long time since County Commissioner Salder. One day they suddenly disappeared, and when asked about it an employee of the railroad company explained it would have been "an admission of negligence to have installed the crossing alarm gongs on the Kershaw accident while the case was pending."

At the mass meeting held the same day feeling ran high and had no cool heads. The committee, however, through the crowd the company's property might have suffered. The committee which visited Salt Lake explained there is no desire among the people at large to ask for or expect more than some protection at the depot crossing.

THE RESOLUTION. The following resolution was adopted at the Monday evening meeting and has been presented to the railroad officials: W. H. Bancroft, vice president and general manager.

E. Buckingham, general superintendent. A. B. Stevenson, division superintendent Oregon Short Line Railway company.

Dear Sirs: The following resolution was adopted by the citizens of Layton in a mass meeting assembled at Farmers' Union hall, Layton, Utah, Oct. 14, 1907. There were 250 citizens present.

"That, whereas, a serious condition exists at Layton, Davis county, Utah, for which the Oregon Short Line Railway company is entirely responsible, in that they have constructed their road-bed and built their depot at such a point, and in such a way that the view of all teams and pedestrians approaching the railroad crossing is obstructed, and the east side is entirely obstructed, that by reason of this condition and the fast speed of through trains at this point, five or six citizens have been killed, and one seriously injured within the last few months, and many others have narrowly escaped being killed, and would have been had it not been for the watchman stationed at the crossing, and the railway agent, Mr. Cowley, and others who have run out and warned approaching teams of their danger."

And, whereas, the railroad company has been repeatedly notified of this dangerous condition at this point, and at the time of the accident of the Kershaw family, the citizens of Layton on mass petition to the general manager, Mr. Bancroft, for protection in the future, to which petition they received a reply from Mr. Bancroft dated July 10, 1907, in which he promised that the petition would be forwarded to the railroad company at the earliest date possible; that according to this promise, as we suppose, an electric bell apparatus was sent to Layton, but was never connected, but remained at the station for some time and has since been shipped away and no protection whatever has been given according to that promise. And whereas, the citizens of Layton, in consequence of the part of the railroad company another of our citizens was killed and another seriously injured this morning by one of the fast trains, therefore, we, the citizens of Layton, hereby demand that the railroad company is unwarranted and unnecessary, and acting on our rights to protect our lives and that of other citizens, be it resolved, that we give the railroad company 24 hours from receipt of this resolution to place a flagman at the railroad crossing at this place, and unless this protection is given at the expiration of this time, we will take such lawful steps and use such means as will be necessary to afford the protection needed."

According to the reports made by the federal revenue department of the government for this district for the past year, some interesting comparisons may be made. The district comprises the states of Montana, Idaho and Utah, and the figures, which have just been given out for the year's business, are as follows:

In Montana, the receipts for 1904 were \$275,973.96; Idaho, \$44,983.08; Utah, \$121,060.74. In 1907 the collections in the three states were as follows: Montana, \$328,312.81; Idaho, \$94,731.55; Utah, \$192,590.40. It will be seen that the increase in collections in Utah for 1907 exceeded by more than \$20,000 those for the same year in Montana, and by more than \$100,000 those for the same year in Idaho. FORGING AHEAD. Internal Revenue Collections Show Great Increase in Favor of Utah. According to the reports made by the federal revenue department of the government for this district for the past year, some interesting comparisons may be made. The district comprises the states of Montana, Idaho and Utah, and the figures, which have just been given out for the year's business, are as follows:

In Montana, the receipts for 1904 were \$275,973.96; Idaho, \$44,983.08; Utah, \$121,060.74. In 1907 the collections in the three states were as follows: Montana, \$328,312.81; Idaho, \$94,731.55; Utah, \$192,590.40. It will be seen that the increase in collections in Utah for 1907 exceeded by more than \$20,000 those for the same year in Montana, and by more than \$100,000 those for the same year in Idaho. For 1905, \$442,019.78; 1906, \$488,970.40; for 1907, \$553,824.91; for 1907, \$616,974.76.
