THE SUNDAY OBSERVANCE.

W. Kitcher, of the Walker and Child House, was before Justice Clinton yesterday afternoon, charged with selling liquor on Sunday. The evidence showed that he had instructed the bar tender not to sell on the Sabbath, and he was discharged, but the bar man was fined \$10, which was handed over to Justice Clinton.

LAURENCE & MANN, of the Salt Lake House, were fined \$100 for a similar offence. The fine was paid by J. D. Jones, drummer, who also charged with selling liquor on Sunday, and will have a hearing at 9 a.m. to-morrow.

PROBATE COURT.—Thursday, Sep. 11th, 2 p.m. The Court resumed its sitting in the case of the People vs. Wm. John O'Brien, who was sworn on the part of the defendant and gave the testimony, which was considerably material. The attorneys then addressed the jury a short time, when the jury retired and soon returned with a verdict of not guilty.

The People, etc., vs. George Stacy and Bernard Morris, for breaking into a saloon on Link Cottonwood and taking therefrom 40 cans of oysters and a bottle of fire-water, which seemed to have had a bad effect on one of the parties, as his face was badly bruised, and he examined, whereupon the Court assessed a fine of \$20 each and costs, or to be kept in jail in default of payment.

The People, etc., vs. John Welch and Henry Roberts, indicted for battery on H. Stout, attorney for defendants, with intent to set aside the verdict. The prisoners were brought into court, and pronounced the following sentence: "You, John Welch and Henry Roberts, having been tried and found guilty by a jury of your country, and sentenced to be imprisoned for the term of six months, and the Court and judgment that you be so confined and that you also pay the cost of this case, and no return having been made of the summons, on motion of plaintiff's attorney, case was continued until Monday next, at 9 a.m."

In the case of the People, etc., vs. Arthur McCaskey, Charles Crawford and J. C. Jones, for larceny, a jury was empaneled and sworn to try the case. Three witnesses were sworn on the part of the prosecution. James Andrews was placed on the stand and kept there until the respective attorneys asked a adjournment till 2 p.m., which the court, with some reluctance granted.
