

ADANA MASSACRE HORRIBLE AFFAIR

Street Fighting Lasted Three Days; at Least a Thousand Persons Were Killed.

TWO OF VICTIMS AMERICANS.

Foreigners and Christians Take Refuge in Consulates—Depredations by Kurds Feared.

Beirut, Syria, April 18.—A terrible upsurge has occurred in Adana, capital of the province of Cilicia, and at least 1,000 persons have been killed. The city has been destroyed by fire. American missionaries named Rogers and Mauser are dead. All the other Americans are safe. The British vice consul, Maj. Daugherty-Wylie, is among the wounded.

At Tarsus there was less loss of life. The Armenian quarter, however, was destroyed. Four thousand refugees are housed in the American mission. The need of relief is urgent, for shortly the fugitives will be on the verge of starvation. Conditions in the vicinity of Alexandretta also are most serious.

KILLING CONFIRMED.

Constantinople, April 18.—Confirmation has been received here of the killing at Adana of two American missionaries, Mr. Rogers and Mr. Mauser. The others connected with the mission are safe, including Mr. Daugherty, who is at Tarsus. Three French warships are hurrying to Mersina, where the situation is desperate.

Foreigners and many Christians have taken refuge in the consulates. The local troops and the governor are doing their best to protect the town, but there is great fear that it cannot hold out much longer against the invasion of the Kurds, who are sweeping down in large numbers. The American vice consul at Mersina, John Debes, has been unable to proceed to Adana, owing to the interruption of communications.

A British warship is proceeding to Alexandretta, which is threatened by the Kurds. Several Armenian towns in that neighborhood have been destroyed.

Alarm is felt at Kharput because of serious depredations by the Kurds in the surrounding villages, although the town itself has not been the scene of any particular disorders.

The tension in Constantinople over the situation still is very great. The people of the capital are more concerned with the advances of Salim's troops than they are with the massacres reported from various quarters.

MORE TROUBLE FEARED.

Constantinople, April 18.—Late telegrams received from the British vice consul at Adana, say further trouble at that place is feared. No additional news has been received from Tarsus or Mersina. A British warship is expected to reach Alexandretta tonight and a French warship will arrive in Mersina tomorrow.

Isaet Pasha, chief of the general staff of the Turkish army, together with several officers, has gone to the encampment of the Salim's troops to confer with the officers on the demands which they submitted to the chamber of deputies. The government is hopeful of a peaceful solution, although some doubt is expressed in parliamentary circles that the cabinet can obtain a vote of confidence tomorrow when it makes its statement concerning the government's policy.

A circular telegram has been received at the foreign embassy from Gen. Husni Pasha, commanding the Saloniki army, in which he says: "I have the honor to inform you respectfully that the object of the army corps in marching on Constantinople is merely for the re-establishment of the constitution, which is sacred to all true Ottomans, and the legal punishment of the cursed authors of the anarchy and disorders, by the reaction of which humanity has always suffered. Be certain, excellency, that the lives and property of foreigners, the honored guests of our dear fatherland, will be safeguarded, and that tranquility and security will be assured the entire population."

The Saloniki branch of the committee of Union and Progress has addressed a strongly-worded telegram to the Sultan, precisely imputing to him a violation of his oath to uphold the constitution. Many battalions of the garrison at Constantinople, it is stated, are showing repentance at their recent act. They declare that they were misled into believing that the Sultan's law and the constitution were in danger. This is regarded as a hopeful sign.

AMBASSADORS TO CHINA.

Washington, April 19.—April 26 is the date fixed by the imperial government of China for the presentation of letters of credence by special ambassadors on the occasion of the burial ceremonies for the late emperor of China.

Minister Rockhill will represent the United States. The ceremonies will be in connection with the removal of the body of the late emperor to the tomb which will be its last resting place.

MILITARY GLORY.

Trimming Reduced.

Washington, April 19.—Military men are going to make an appeal to the senatorial managers of the tariff legislation to reduce the duty on material entering into the manufacture of epaulettes and gold trimming used in the official apparel of the army and navy personnel.

These articles they say can be purchased in Manila, China and in Japan at a considerably less cost than in this country. This is due to the fact that the articles are manufactured only in France and everything of that nature that comes from that country is confronted with a duty of 60 per cent in the United States as against 25 per cent in the Philippines and 10 per cent in Japan.

REMARKABLE CASE OF APHASIA AND AGRAPHIA

New York, April 19.—In Rudolf Aur, a bookkeeper, who was found wandering aimlessly along the streets of Brooklyn yesterday, surgeons of the Norwegian hospital think they have one of the most complete cases on record of combined aphasia and agraphia.

He can remember absolutely nothing of his previous life and after taking a drink of water lost his power of speech. Now he cannot even write his impressions on paper. It is believed that troubling over separation from his wife caused his breakdown.

PORTO RICO'S PROSPERITY.

Maj. Gen. Wood Brings Glowing Accouncements of It.

New York, April 19.—Glowing reports of Porto Rico's prosperity and progress are being brought by Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, commander of the department of the island, who arrived here yesterday, after making an inspection of the army affairs on the island.

"I do not think I have ever seen a more beautiful island than Porto Rico is at present," said Gen. Wood. "It is my first visit to the island and with Col. Robert Lee Howe, the new commander of the troops there, I visited all sections of the island. The people seemed to be prospering."

"The native troops impressed me favorably and they are a well drilled, well disciplined body of men. Col. Howe is familiar with Porto Rican conditions and is pleased with his new assignment."

Gen. Wood said Porto Rico expected to profit by a record-breaking sugar and tobacco crop.

BEATIFICATION OF JOAN OF ARC

Solemn Ceremonies Attending it Carried Out With Great Pomp in St. Peter's.

POPE HONORED OCCASION.

Thirty Thousand French Pilgrims, And Nearly All Bishops of France Were Present.

Rome, April 18.—In the presence of 30,000 French pilgrims, practically all the bishops of France, many cardinals and family descendants of the now saint, the solemn ceremonies in the beatification of Joan of Arc were carried out in St. Peter's today. The pope does not attend beatifications in person, but as a mark of special devotion, he assisted at a solemn service, when he replaced the ceremony of veneration of relics, none existing in this case. At 9:30 voices of electric lights burst out in St. Peter's and the organ thundered. The long procession of cardinals then marched in.

The basilica, presented a fairy-like appearance, with the vaults and the velvet draperies and everywhere strings of electric lights were artistically arranged. Huge pictures, representing the miracles of Joan of Arc, and her statue were placed over the high altar, but they were veiled. The ceremony began by the reading of the brief, at the last word of which the veils fell. The statue appeared framed with electric bulbs; the bells pealed forth, and the massed choir intoned the "Te Deum," which was taken up by the vast throng.

Many of the pilgrims, overcome, burst into frantic cheers, which were immediately suppressed.

The afternoon ceremonial was no less impressive. The pope passed through the ranks of the kneeling pilgrims, followed by his court and picturesque guards to the altar. After the singing of the liturgical hymn the advocates for the beatification presented to the pope the traditional gifts of a basket of flowers and the life of Joan of Arc, magnificently bound.

An incident which is alleged to have occurred during a battle in Cuba in 1898 will be related as contributory proof that Hains has been subject to emotional insanity for years.

At the light at La Guira, in which Captain Hains, his brother, Major Hains, and their father, General Hains, participated, it is said that Captain Hains had ordered his father to the rear and struck at the elder officer with his sword when he refused to obey the order.

Mrs. Claudia Libby Hains, the captain's young wife, against whom divorce proceedings are now pending, may be a witness for the state. It is argued that she cannot afford to allow the recital of her alleged misconduct with Annis to go unchallenged in view of the fact that she will seek to regain possession of her three children, who are now in the custody of Captain Hains' parents.

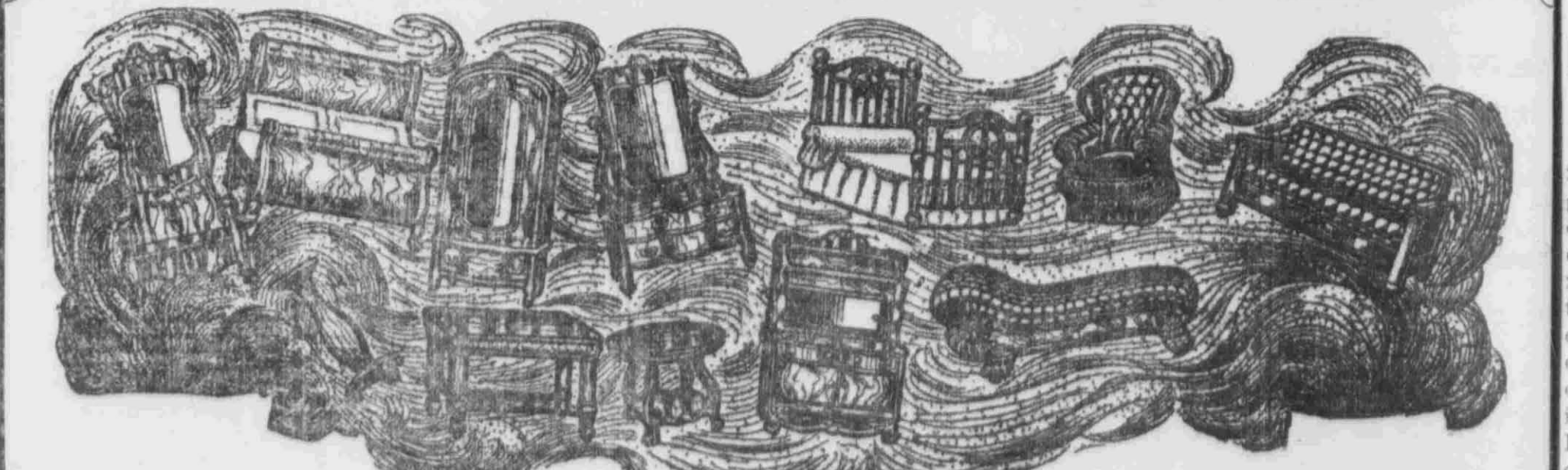
