ASKS A DIVORCE.

Mrs. Hanks Wants to Be Released from the Husband Who Deserted Her.

Mary E. Hanks of Logan city Cache county, commenced proceedings yesterday for the Fourth district court for divorce from her husband, Eph. M. Hanks. Desertion and failure to provide are named in the complaint as the grounds upon which a decree is asked for. It will be remembered that Hanks caused great excitement through his unexpected appearance in the fall of 1890. At that time he left home with considerable money in his possession, having told his family that he was going across the Logan river to a farm for a load of hay. Not returning that night, the next day a search was instituted resulting in finding his hat and coat floating down the river. The coat which he rode in was found on a sand bar in the river. The search was (as in the Taylor case) kept up for days, the general supposition being that Hanks had lost his life in attempting to cross the stream. At first no one suspected that he had deserted his family and home, but that he did so is now all in California turned out to be the facts in the case. Mrs. Hanks asks to be given the custody of her five children, the oldest of which is fifteen years of age, and the property which now stands in the name of her husband. Every instrument has been offered Hanks to return but to no purpose. What possessed him to forsake his home and family may never be known.

Probate Court Matters.

Judge Bishop rendered a decision yesterday in the case of *James Nelson vs. the State*, reducing the attorney's fee from \$1,500 to \$1,000. The case is a complicated one and has been under consideration for some time. Nelson asked for Denmark several years ago, intending to be gone only a short while. What because of him no one knows. Recently two heirs, a brother and sister, put in claims through the Danish consul. There is about \$2000 involved in the settlement.

Union Pacific Wreck.

The Cache valley accommodation train, made up of sixty cars came in late last evening and while backing up to the yards, collided with an extra short line freight train which was just pulling in. Four cars of the Cache valley train toppled over into the ditch obstructing the southern Pacific track for several hours. The length of the Cache valley train is said to have been the cause of the accident. It was impossible for the crew of the train to see the signals of the switchmen. Fortunately no one got hurt.

Salt Lake Wins.

The shooting match between the Ogden and Salt Lake shot gun clubs came off yesterday, resulting in a victory for the Salt Lake with a score of 21 to 20. Each club was made up of fourteen men. The best of feeling prevailed and some excellent work was done. Better for the fourth time in succession won the championship of the Territory. Much interest was taken in the contest, more than upon any previous occasion.

SPRINGVILLE FAILURE.

A Wholesale Produce Dealer Goes Down for \$11,000.

William M. Roylance, Springville's wholesale produce dealer, assigned yesterday in favor of his creditors, U. L. Dennison is the assignee. The liabilities approximated \$11,000, and the assets, it is claimed, amount to \$3,000. The principal and preferred creditor is the Springville bank for \$4,000. Then Brothers & Co. are creditors to the extent of \$1,200, and nearly every cooperative store in the county has a claim to some extent. Inability to secure a market for produce and the general stringency in the money market caused the failure.

A coat and a vest were removed from the rack in front of the cooperative store at Provo yesterday morning. The purchaser of the articles has not been discovered. A frequent customer who purchased a pair of pants is suspected.
