EASTERN.
About the Currency.

WASHINGTON, 6.—The Comptroller of the Currency reports that the amount of additional circulation issued during the month of June was \$1,015,525; the amount of legal tender notes deposited in the same period was \$3,009,625; the additional circulation issued since the passage of the act of June 20th, 1874, is \$11,601,892; the amount of circulation destroyed and retired during the same time \$9,627,098, showing an actual increase in the bank circulation during the year of only \$1,974,833; the amount of legal tender notes deposited for the purpose of retiring the circulation \$25,623,087, and the amount deposited by the banks in liquidation of the act of June 20th, 1874, making a total of \$23,933,073. Deducting from this the amount of \$9,627,098, the amount of circulation permanently retired, will leave \$13,905,975 of legal tender notes on deposit July first for the purpose of retiring the circulation.

A Dreadful Storm.

NYAK, N. Y., 6.—A dreadful storm commenced here this afternoon, with very heavy rain, hail and high winds. Lightning and thunder were frequent. Two men, named Newman and Tucker, were instantly killed by the lightning; several others were injured and property up to the roots. At eight o'clock the storm still continued and immense damage had been done.

Six Boys Drowned.

PAUL RIVER, Mass., 6.—A party of seven lads, bathing at the junction of the Wantupa Lake and the main river, were drowned. The boys were from the city of New York, and were visiting their parents in the country.

Jealousy and Murder.

SCRANTON, Pa., 6.—A young man named Frank Doud was murdered here last night by a young man named Walter Whitaker; they had been rival suitors for the hand of a young woman, and the murder was committed in a fit of jealousy.

TOLEDO, 6.—A fire, to-night, destroyed three buildings owned by the Toledo Lumber Co., valued at \$100,000.

During the celebration at West Union, Ohio, yesterday, Peter Kridle was killed by the premature discharge of a cannon.

The Corps in Nebraska.—The 24th Infantry, 2nd Division, 5th Army Corps, arrived at Omaha, Neb., yesterday.

OMAHA, 6.—The Herald's special from all parts of the State represent the crops generally in a very flattering condition. The copious rains during the past week have done very little damage.

The eastern editorial account of the party arrived here this evening; they will remain until Thursday, and go west on a special train. A public reception and banquet will be given them at the Grand Central Hotel to-morrow evening.

The Wheat Harvest.

CHICAGO, 6.—Reports just received from various places in the north-west show a very good crop of wheat, notwithstanding the heavy rains which have prevailed during the past week.

A Trade Meeting.

A meeting of merchants was held this afternoon at the Exchange Building, to consult with a delegation of fruit growers from Florida in regard to establishing a regular trade in fruit between Chicago and that State.

Gold Mining.

GOLO SPRING, N. Y., 6.—A fire here this morning burned five houses and damaged three others; loss \$85,000.

WESTERN.

Nominated for Congress—\$750,000 Fine.

SAN FRANCISCO, 6.—The Democratic convention in the 1st Congressional district, this evening, nominated W. A. Pipes, of this city.

A fire at Tulare city, this p.m., destroyed the entire business portion of the town; loss \$120,000.

FOREIGN.

SPAIN.

LONDON, 6.—The *Mark Lane Express* says the weather is calculated to greatly hinder sowing and harvesting, and consequently the price of wheat is rather threatened for the future. Wheat, which is a shilling higher and in some markets two shillings.

Another Failure—Going to Spanish.

Sunkin & Co. have failed. Their liabilities are estimated at \$1,250,000. The British gunboat *Lively* sails from Portsmouth for the Spanish coast, to protect British interests in the port threatened by military operations.

PRUSSIA.

COMING TO FRANCE.

BERLIN, 6.—Dr. Kuntz is about to leave here for San Francisco, to superintend the erection of the naval hospital which the government has decided to build at the city of San Francisco. He is going in the *Albatross*, a French gunboat.

SPAIN.

CARLIST MOVEMENT.

MADRID, 6.—The *Diario* says it has reason to believe that Don Carlos's army, feeling incapable of resisting the attack of the Alfonsist forces, left the Garbana and crossed the Ebro, and is now marching to Catalonia. Several guns of heavy calibre have been dismounted from steamers at San Sebastian; they are intended for the use of the Carlists.

NEW CONSTITUTION PREPARED.—Movements of the Military.

The commission of nine members, appointed to prepare a draft of a new constitution for the Kingdom of Spain, has concluded its labors. The draft is a declaration of individual and religious liberty; the legislature is to be composed of a senate and chamber of deputies, composed, in other liberal monarchial states, and the magistracy is to be irremovable. It is believed that the constitution will be adopted without modification.

IT IS REPORTED THAT THE ALFONSOISTS HAVE CAPTURED SANTA VIEGA, AND THAT THE CARLISTS HAVE OBTAINED THE RAILWAY BETWEEN HENDAY AND BARCELONA, AT TORDENA.

FRANCE.

PARIS, 6.—The report of the recall of M. de Camille, French ambassador at Berlin, was groundless.

ARRESTED, ETC.

The father of Don Carlos has been arrested at Henday, on the French coast, and conducted to Bayonne. The Spanish man-of-war *Vittoria* has returned to the northern coast to complete the destruction of the Carlist forts.

AUSTRIA.

A GRAND FUNERAL.

VIENNA, 6.—The funeral of the Emperor Ferdinand took place today. The Emperor and Empress of Austria, the Emperor and Empress of Germany, and the Emperor and Empress of Russia, were present. The funeral was a grand and impressive ceremony.

IRELAND.

ANOTHER GRAND DISPLAY OF CHILDRAN.

RELEASED, 6.—The children's team arrived in this city this evening; their reception surpassed that of any other team. The children were dressed in their national costumes, and the procession was a grand and impressive one.
