"PATRIOTS" ALONE TO RULE OR RUIN

Removals of Policemen and Fire- City Officers Interested in Deal men "For the Good of The Service."

NO IMPROVEMENT ANYWHERE | WILL GO BEFORE THE COURT

Fire Department Full of Untrained Men-Police Force Would Cause A Dyspeptic to Laugh.

In view of the recent shakeup in the fire department, criticism of the police department, and the uncertainty as to the future of other departments, there s considerable discussion going on at this time among business men and taxpayers with reference to the deplorable condition of affairs that now

exist in two of the most important branches of the city government, the police and fire departments. Can Salt Lake City have an efficient police or fire force when either, or both, are at the mercy of curbstone politicins and creatures who feed on religi

ans and creatures who feed on rengrous hatred?
Following the first so-called victory of the so-called "American" party in this city, when Ez Thompson was elected mayor, both departments were torn to pieces. Men were removed right and left for religious or political reasons, to the extent that no man in reasons, to the extent that no man in either department felt safe. Competent and trustworthy men were removed by the "reform" gang "for the good of the service." At least that is what the "Americans" claimed.

LYNCH GOES FIRST.

Former Mayor Thompson removed W. J. Lynch as chief of police for "the good of the service," and appointed George A. Sheets in his stead. Foliowing the latter's appointment and confirmation came the removal of trusted and capable officers by the wholesale and then came the big scanwholesale, and then came the big scandal in the McWhirter case, a case so rotten and corrupt that it made the police department of Salt Lake City the joke of the whole country.

W. H. Bywater was removed as

the joke of the whole country.

W. H. Bywater was removed as chief of the fire department, "for the good of the service," and Charles T. Vail was appointed in his stead, "for the good of the service." Following the appointment of Vail, a large number of experienced and capable firemen were discharged from the department "for the good of the service." Such men as Capt. Workman, of thirty years' service, Capt. Earl, Capt. Young and many others were forced to leave the department to make room for ward heelers, men of no experience whatever.

MAYOR RESIGNS NEXT.

After George Sheets took charge of the police department—always under the direction of the inner circle, of course—a score of able, experienced and honest officers were removed, "for the good of the service." The pressthe good of the service." The pressure got so hot that Thompson was forced to resign. Sheets resigned and Roderick McKenzie resigned. Tom D. Pitt was appointed chief of the police Pitt was appointed chief of the police department, and the gang that wants to either rule or ruin is after his scalp because "he will not stand hitched."

Because of religious hatred, members of the "inner circle" induced Mayor Bransford to remove Capt. John B. Burbidge from the department "for the good of the service." It was proclaimed by the organ of crooks that in the removal of Capt. Burbidge, harmony in the department would be brought about and the police force become more efficient. Capt. Burbidge was removed "for the good of the service." service."

WHAT RESULT?

"In what particular," is asked by thinking citizens, "has the police department been improved by the removal of Capt. Burbidge and many competent officers? Has there been more harmony and less crime? And, is it not a factsthat the police department is in worse condition today than it has been in a score of years, in spite of the fact that Tom Pitt is doing all he can to combat the baleful influence of the inner circle? Have conditions been improved in the police department by the removal of Capt. Burbidge and other officers?

As to the fire department: Bywater As to the fire department: Bywater was removed "for the good of the service," and Vail was appointed by the same gang. Now Vall has been kicked out "for the good of the service," and with him his assistant. Byron Crosby, thus leaving the department without a regularly appointed head, and all this for "the good of the service."

What is the result?

Efficiency does not exist in either the police or fire departments. The men are in constant fear that their heads will fall into the basket and for that reason they do not take the inter-est in their work they would if they knew that their positions depended upon merit and not upon their religious standing.

Did it benefit the police department to remove Burbidge and a score of men under him? Did it benefit the fire department to

remove Bywater, Vail and many com-petent and experienced fire fighters? Did these removals benefit the citizens who pay taxes?

Who was benefitted by them?
The so-called "American" party.
