Grim returned to Salt Lake and Lucas went on to Pocatello where he was to meet J. C. Barnes and then go on to Butte.

DOINGS AT BOISE.

Bose, Id., Feb. 15.—John C. Barnes, one of the five men who are directly interested at this time in the organization of the Intermountain baseball league, arrived in Boise yesterday afternoon and will remain here until the meeting relative to Boise having a club in the proposed league.

Mr. Barnes comes to Boise with the statement that he will be instrumental in getting the club, but whether Boise will be included in the organization is not known.

The veteran baseball man will this morning call on the business men and leaders of the city getting their opinions on the proposed league with Boise as a member. "We don't want the people to be coming up here to play," Barnes said, "but we are going to do what we can to get them to come." Mr. Barnes last evening, "If the people said the right spirit and we think the thing will be successful, the citizens may not be asked to contribute more than to pay their share of the gate."

The situation in Butte is not quite so bright as local fans would like to see. The fans in the local town of Ogden, who are waiting for Lucas to arrive, has promised them high class ball. There is considerable interest in the proposed league but the situation will have to be gone over thoroughly before the Butte fans will be satisfied. Strouthers stated that Boise and Helena were most anxious for places in the league.
