Schramm for the druggists ,and G. W. Morgan, Harry Finch and J. E. Shaffer. for the restauranteurs. The druggists and restaurant men agreed that the present \$400 license for them is high enough, and did not at all approve of the saloon men's proposition to raise the same to \$1,200. The proceedings were conducted on the Star Chamber plan-that is, nothing but the stars would be witnesses to the same, and reporters were "ruthlessly" excluded. However, it was learned that the liquor men insisted that the druggists go out of the retail business or pay the regular li-cense of \$1,200 into that there was no ob-
