SENSATIONAL ARREST. Prominent Lehf Man Held for Arson, Ac-

cused by Notorious Characters. Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., March 5 .- J. E. Gotter, the Lehl merchant who was ar-

rested yesterday, was taken before Jus-tice Noon on a charage of arson con-nected with the burning of the Lehi creamery, last November. The arrest of Mr. Cotter is a great sur-prise to Lehi people, and few if any believe he is guilty of the charge brought against him.

The creamery was insured for \$3,500, and the company settled on Dec. 14 for \$3,200.
