Mahan and Douglass of N. Y. Telegraphers' Union Went Without Authority.

ARBITRATION NOT ASKED FOR.

Operators Haven't Asked it and W. T. T. Co. Supt. Says There's Nothing To Arbitrate.

New York, Sept. 20.—Thomas L. Mahan and Arthur G. Douglass, officials of the local telegraphers' union, had no authority to go to Washington and request Labor Commissioner Neill to take steps looking to arbitration of the present strike, according to a statement made at the headquarters of the strike-union in this city today. It was stated that they had no other authority than to announce the terms upon which the men would insist. It was declared also on behalf of the union that the New York union had not adopted a resolution calling for arbitration.

President Small said today that the situation is more hopeful within the last three days than it has been since the strike began.

"I do not look for a speedy termination of the strike, and negotiations that are now pending may last a week or 10 days," he added. "The telegraph company and the strikers cannot get together. Arbitration must come, if it comes at all, from third and outside sources."

Mr. Small expects to leave for Chicago today or tomorrow.

Gen. Supt. Brooks of the Western Union Telegraph company said today that his company had nothing to arbitrate.

"We have all the men we desire," said Mr. Brooks, "and there is no need for us to seek to secure the services of the men who left the employ of the company. Furthermore, we will never again tolerate the conditions that existed before the strike. The action of the union operators before the strike in deliberately interfering with the business of the company and in abusing those who failed to join their organization will never occur again in the operating rooms of the Western Union. There are 175 operators who were employed in this city by this company prior to the strike who will never again secure work with the company. They were all trouble-makers."

Edward J. Nally, vice president and general manager of the Postal Telegraph Cable company, sent the following telegram today to all Postal superintendents:

"There is not the slightest ground for the report that we are to arbitrate with the strikers. No offer of office and assure all that there will be no compromise, and to pay no heed to reports to the contrary."

WELL-TO-DO WIDOW COMMITS SUICIDE.

New York, Sept. 20.—Mrs. Margaret Carter, a widow of French extraction and said to have a highly temperamental character, shot and killed herself today in a room adjoining that of John J. White, a wealthy New Yorker, who lay sick in bed.

Mrs. Carter had nursed Mr. White and was a friend of Mrs. White, who was at her bedside.

Recently, a professional nurse replaced Mrs. Carter. Mrs. Carter had been ill for a long while, according to Dr. Foster, who was Mrs. Carter's physician and who was also attending Mr. White.

Mrs. Carter came to the White residence last night and asked for Mrs. White. The latter being away, the visitor wanted to see Mr. White, but Dr. Foster, who was present, insisted that the patient was too ill to be seen.

Mrs. Carter carried a bundle, afterward found to contain a \$100 bill, a receipt and a pair of cuff buttons, which she insisted was important she should give to Mr. White. She walked the floor for hours after being admitted to the house. Dr. Foster ascribes the suicide to ill health and nervousness. Mrs. Carter was in comfortable circumstances, but lived much alone. Charitable work occupied much of her time and she was well acquainted with many society leaders and seemed to know many theatrical people.

KAISER WATCHING SIEGE OPERATIONS.

Posen, Prussia, Sept. 20.—Emperor William is personally watching the siege operations which the German troops are carrying out near here on the same general lines as those of the Japanese at Port Arthur. Many heavy long range siege guns and numerous batteries of field artillery are engaged. The distinguishing feature being the firing of live projectiles against the improvised fortifications. As the artillery is using shells with full bursting charges, the ground has been cleared of inhabitants and animals.

No permits have been given foreign officers to witness these maneuvers. It is understood these operations are the result of the gigantic siege experiments conducted by the French army last year.

RUSSIA TO PERSIA.

Disorders Affect Russian Interests and Must be Put Down.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 20.—The Russia today publishes an official note confirming the reports that Russia has made immediate use of the free hand given her under the terms of the Anglo-Russian treaty. The Russian minister at Tehran has stated to the Persian government that the Russian government has followed with friendly interest the labors of the Persian national assembly in endeavoring to bring about reforms, but regretted that under the new regime disorders had occurred, affecting Russian interests and added that if the Persian authorities were unable to put down the disturbance, it might become necessary for Russia to take steps in the direction of military intervention on her own account.

JURY SECURED TO TRY TIREY L. FORD.

San Francisco, Sept. 20.—The bribery trial of Chief Counsel Tirey L. Ford, of the United railroads, will be begun in earnest next Monday afternoon, with the first introduction of evidence by the prosecution. The jury was completed at 4:40 o'clock this afternoon. The following men compose the trial panel:

Edward W. Bender, publisher of law books; Nels C. Mortensen, contractor; Oscar Ferguson, insurance agent; Florence Driscoll, plumber; John Olsen, shippping agent; Edward W. Strange, jeweler; Frederick M. Mercom, art dealer; Arthur W. Johnson, grocer; Daniel Kelly, insurance agent; Charles W. Gould, manufacturer's agent; John G. Charve, Jr., contractor; George Gohler, grocer.

Two of these 12, Mortensen and Strange, were members of the jury which convicted Vice President Louis Glass of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company of the bribery of Supervisor Thomas F. Lomenzan, in the interest of the corporation named. Ford is on trial for the bribery of Lomenzan in the interest of the United railroads. It being charged that on the 15th of May, 1906, he paid or aided and abetted in the payment of \$4,000 to Lomenzan, as the price of his vote in favor of an ordinance empowering the streetcar company to electrify its cable lines throughout San Francisco city and county.

The 12 men sat for photographs for the newspapers and the were taken at the Fairmont hotel, where they will be quarantined until they have passed upon the guilt of the accused man or confessed their inability to reach a verdict.

Before being taken from the courtroom Juror Olsen, informed the court of a wedding to be celebrated in his family tonight and asked for permission to attend it in charge of one of the bailiffs. It was granted, and Deputy Sheriff Ryan was delegated the duty of watching him.

Judge Leving announced that owing to the smallness of the force of deputies at Sheriff O'Neill's command, the court had requested Chief of Police Blaney to detail a number of blueshirts to assist in the preservation of order throughout the trial which, it is expected will be attended by big crowds.

SEVEN PEOPLE INJURED IN AN AUTO ACCIDENT.

Denver, Colo., Sept. 20.—Seven persons were injured, three perhaps fatally, as a result of a collision between an automobile and an electric car on the outskirts of this city tonight. The party, which included several Chicago people, had been on a sightseeing tour and was returning to the city. The car was running along at a good speed when an electric car loomed up, coming directly across the path of the automobile. The chauffeur expected the car to slow and evidently the motor-man depended on the automobile to slacken its speed. Neither car had its lights on and the collision resulted. The injured:

Alex Ferris, her son, crushed and internally injured; may die.
Mrs. Russell Dale, Chicago; both legs broken.
Mrs. S. K. Gardner, Chicago; bruised about the body and shocked.
Mrs. S. F. Howe, Denver; wrist broken.
Mrs. L. C. Jones, Denver; slightly hurt.

James H. Tremble, Denver, chauffeur, badly bruised and believed internally injured.
All were taken to Mercy hospital.

LUSITANIA MAY TRY FOR EASTWARD RECORD.

New York, Sept. 20.—The great turbine steamship, Lusitania, which reached this port last Friday morning on her maiden voyage across the Atlantic in 5 days and 54 minutes from Queenstown, will sail at 6 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, for her return trip. While nothing has been said by Capt. Watts about an attempt to lower the record of 5 days 8 hours 58 minutes New York to Queenstown, now held by the Lusitania, it is believed the big steamer will hold the honor for the westbound trip, as she now holds that for the westbound, when she finishes the run to the Irish port.

The choice of a plot to take the Lusitania through the new channel tomorrow has developed a big row among the pilots. Frank Cramer, the pilot who was chosen to bring the big Cunarder through last Friday, has been superseded in that honor by Edward Young, one of the oldest men in the service. Cramer has presented charges before the pilot commissioners against all his associates who were on the station boat when he boarded the incoming Lusitania. The charges were brought by Cramer because his companions wrote the word "screw" in three feet letters on a sheet and hung it in the main rigging of the steam pilot boat New Jersey, when Cramer boarded the last-coming.

HOSTILE MOORISH CHIEFS.

Did Not See Gen. Drinde and Armistice Was Extended.

Casa Blanca, Sept. 20.—The hostile Moorish chiefs who have been negotiating for peace had not appeared before Gen. Drude at 2 o'clock this afternoon, and the armistice was extended until tomorrow.
