

prosecution of the flat to obtain a remission of the sentence against the claimant, to promote the passage of a bill in the forthcoming session of Parliament for the reversal of the judgment in the case, evidence on points of mistaken identity being forthcoming, and for the restoration to the claimant of the properties, heirlooms and possessions of the Tichborne baronetcy.

LONDON, 23.—The Viceroy of India telegraphs to-day as follows: Dispatches from General Roberts, of the 16th, 17th and 18th insts., have just been received. The defenses of Shipur cantonments have been completed; the enemy occupies the heights over the city, but does not descend into the plains, which are patrolled by our cavalry. General Roberts was waiting the arrival of General Gough to make an attack, as he would then be strong enough to hold all the important positions, but will attack the enemy before the arrival of General Gough, if a favorable opportunity offers. Our loss on the 14th was eighteen killed and ninety-nine wounded, of whom eight have since died. The enemy's loss was very heavy. Osman Khan and other Afghan leaders were killed on the 17th.

The enemy appeared on Seahung, but they were quickly dislodged without loss on our side. The enemy's numbers are diminishing. Mahomed Jan Markahar Mail, the Afghan leader, has proclaimed the eldest son of the ex-Ameer, Yakob Khan, Ameer.

General Roberts writes on the 20th that a considerable quantity of grain had reached Lataband safely, showing that the road is open so far. On the 19th the British lost 19 wounded, and Maj. Cook, who obtained the Victoria Cross for gallant services, died of wounds received in a previous engagement. Two officers are ill from small pox, and pneumonia is increasing owing to the cold weather and the exposure of the men. Otherwise the health of the troops is good. The number of sick among the Europeans only amounts to four per cent.

LONDON, 24.—A Kabul dispatch of the 17th says: To-day the enemy assembled on Lishung Ridge lining it in thousands. We shelled and dispersed them. The engineers are making an inner line of defense.

A St. Petersburg correspondent is positively informed that no severe measures of general depression are likely to be sanctioned.

A dispatch from Berlin says: Bismarck has postponed his visit there in consequence of a severe attack of rheumatism.

Survivors from the *Borussia* report that the captain and majority of the crew remained on board the vessel. Only 60 persons left in the boats. A Cork dispatch reports 184 persons were aboard the *Borussia*. The captain, on seeing all efforts to save the vessel would be useless, ordered the boats to be got ready, some rafts were prepared and necessities provided. The vessel was abandoned at night, there being then 10 or 11 feet of water in the engine room. Four or five boats were lowered about the same time, but owing to the darkness and heavy sea at the time, they soon lost sight of each other. One of the survivors states that 76 passengers embarked at Liverpool. The vessel reached Corunna Nov. 13, all well. After having shipped some cargo and embarked about 80 Spanish emigrants, the *Borussia* proceeded for Havana on the 26th, the wind being light from the southeast with a calm sea. On November 30 the wind freshened and increased to a gale. On the following day it suddenly chopped to the north northwest, blowing strong with a heavy cross sea, in which the ship labored heavily. At noon she sprung a leak amidships. All efforts at the pumps were fruitless to keep the ship free. The water filled the engine room and stokehole, putting out the fires and stopping the engines. The crew still continued to work at the pumps until the next day (the 2nd inst.) when it was determined to abandon the vessel. The survivors state that the steamer's covering board when they shoved off was not more than two inches above the water. It is supposed she must have gone down with her living freight.

A Kabul correspondent reports the British force has doubtless a religious war to face, but the fervor of the Afghans will subside as reinforcements arrive. In the operations on the heights on the 14th

inst., two mountain guns were lost.

A Paris dispatch dated midnight says: Leroyer has gone to Egypt for the benefit of his health.

A correspondent has just learned from an authoritative source, that Pres. Grevy has again summoned Defreyne, and that an arrangement has been definitely arrived at as follows: Defreyne becomes premier and minister of foreign works; Waddington, foreign minister; Challemeil Lacour, minister of the interior and public worship; Herald, minister of justice; Leon Say, minister of finance; Jules Ferry, minister of public instruction; Friard, minister of commerce; Gen. Farre, minister of war; Admiral Jauriquiberry, minister of marine; and M. Cocheny, minister of posts and telegraphs.
