Terrific Wind Storm—Farming and Dairying Interests—Better Stock and Better Produce Wanted—Overstocked, etc.

UPPER KANAB, March 9, 1873.
Editor Deseret News:

While I write we are having the most terrific wind storm of the winter. For three days it has been blowing and snowing. This morning it is clearing away, with a gale drifting the snow so as to stop all travel for some time.

The past year has been very favorable to the farmer, but rather dry for the dairyman. Crops have come in good to excellent, especially cereals and potatoes.

The dairying interests have suffered slightly from dry weather, making the grass to dry up sooner than usual. Last year about four hundred cows were milked within a radius of five miles, and many tons of cheese made, which has been sold out, there being but very little now in the market. This year, 1873, will be one of the best years ever known in this part of Utah for dairy purposes, as the snow is very deep and the ground will be very wet in the spring, which will give the grass a fine start.

The greatest difficulties labored under are a want of better dairy stock (the shorthorns have been tried by the Kanab Co-operative and they are simply a failure), better machinery, better reennets or valls. There were a few Bavarian reennets imported last year by one of our enterprising citizens, which made a marked improvement in the quality of the cheese, but our citizens, especially those owning large dairies, are slow to take hold of new things that cost cash, as long as beef and pig reennets can be purchased for fruit. Another serious difficulty which we labor under is the want of union to start a cheese factory with skilled labor, so as to make a better and more saleable article of cheese. Where we now get 15 to 18 cents per pound we could as well have 22 to 25 cents.

This part of the country is already overstocked with cattle, horses, and sheep, and rumor says that there are more coming. It is a good Summer range, but owing to the scarcity of water, very limited. As far as its being a Winter range is concerned, it is not possible to winter stock here one Winter out of three, unless they are fed, and hay is now worth twenty-five dollars a ton in cash, or stock at cash rates.

There was stock enough died on the range south of this place a few miles during the Winter of 1872 and 1873 to have paid two cents a day for wintering all the stock on the same range on a good herd ground further south. I fear that this Winter will cause a still greater loss. I am yours,

CARDINAL MANNING ON PAUPERISM.—Cardinal Manning, in a recent sermon, referred to English pauperism in the following pointed language: "England, the richest of all countries, has upon it a stain and a shame not to be found in countries which Englishmen assume to despise; he meant pauperism, an intense demoralized state of poverty. Poverty in itself was an honorable state; but pauperism was something altogether distinct from poverty. Pauperism was that wrecked condition of men and of families out of which there was no rising by any effort of their own. And what did it come from? It would take too long to endeavor to say. One reason he would state, the overwhelming prosperity of the rich, the closeness of the hands and the hearts, and the ignorance in which the rich lived and died of the state of the poor who lived and died round about their dwellings. The possession of wealth and prosperity generated a selfishness and unconsciousness of the sufferings of others, so that men were wrapped up in their own daily indulgence, and were forgetful of those who were in want."

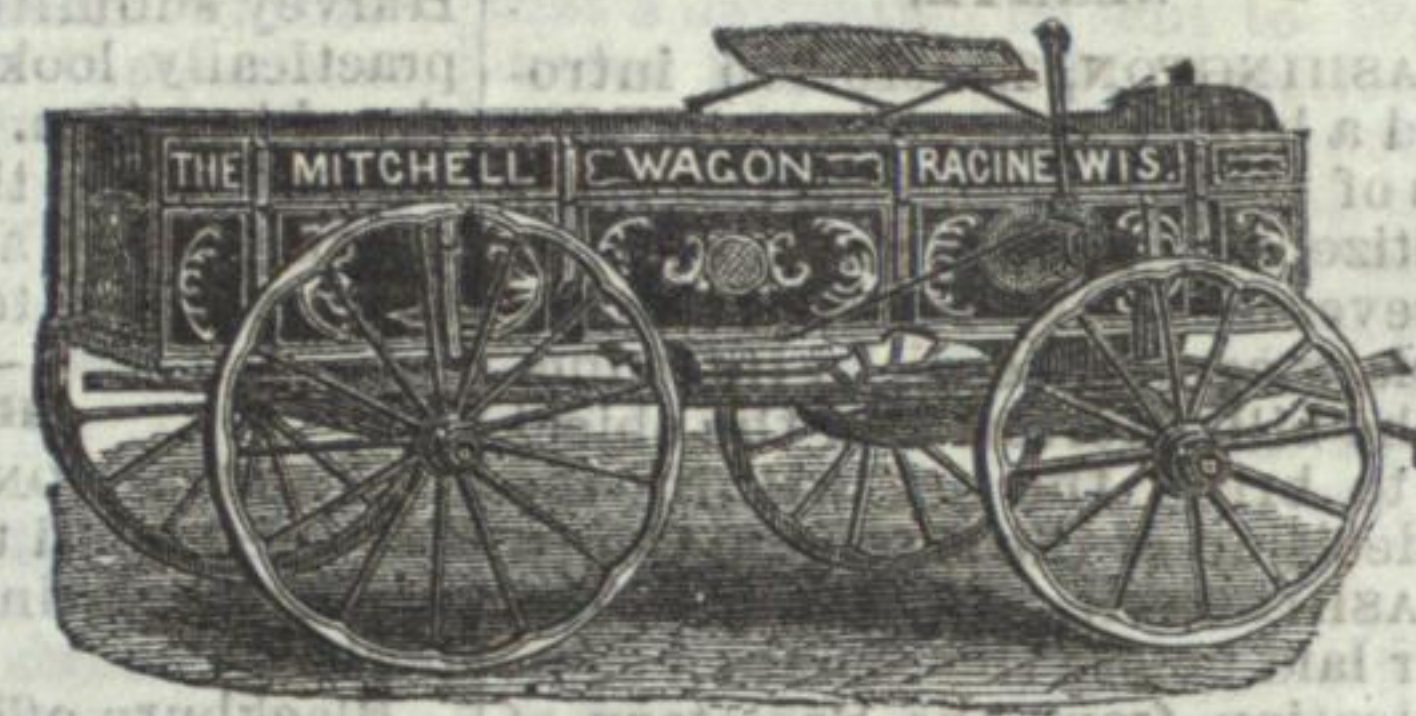
