> Emigration of Chinese to the Sandwich Islands. WASHINGTON, 30 .- United States Minister Merrill has sent to the Department of State copies of the regulations recently promulgated by the Hawalian kingdom controlling the emi-gration of Chinese. In substance the

regulations are as follows:

No vessel will be allowed to land more than 25 Chinese passengers at any point in the kingdom, unless the passengers in excess of that number are provided with passports entitling them to enter. Passports entitling holders to return to the kingdom will be granted persons of Chinese nationwhose parents are residing in the kingdom or who may not be of more than ten years of age. Passports entitling the holder to enter the kingdom will also be granted at the foreign office to such persons of Chinese nationality as the Minister of Foreign Affairs may claim it proper to admit to the kingdom. All orders and instructions regulating the incoming of Chinese into the kingdom heretofore made and

proclaimed are rescinded. Railway Building. CHICAGO, 20.—The Railway Age in an article to appear in the issue of Oct. 1st, says: The surprising and awakening activity in regard to rail-way building becomes evident. The year opened with gloom and depression in business circles, but the record of the past nine months shows the total number of new roads in progress and proposed in the United States to and proposed in the United States to be 626, with a total mileage of 44,393. This mileage of proposed new roads and those already in progress of con-struction, are distributed as follows: New England States, 813; Middle States, 2,333; Southern States, 9,313; Western States, 27,696; Pacific States, 4,137. The greater part of the proposed roads are to-be short local lines intended for the legitimate needs of communities and generally wanted to give connection with existing roads and to open up regions destitute of railway facilities. A firm of lumber merchants gave their employes the option of being vac-cinated or leaving work. Forty of them this morning went on a strike. They got full of bad whisky and re-turned at noon and threatened to have

dial kindness has welcomed us from dial kindness has welcomed us from G. ntile and Mormon, with a curious distrust in some embittered quarters among the Genttles that is said to reach the absurd point of personal resentment and ill-will, while from the Mormon representatives my welcome has been as genuine as it was ten, twelve and sixteen years ago. I never have been able to understand the warmth of these much berated and much belied Mormon people in their friendship for me. I never did them any effective service in the whole 31 years since my acquaintance with all years since my acquaintance with them began. I have never agreed with their religion. I have always opposed it. I have done nothing more than to publish their virtues, admire their works in subduing the desert and in organizing a great community based upon remarkable industries, in helping to conquer a continent from barbarism and savagery, and fin giving to a Territory intelligent social order, cheap government and independent homes to government and independent homes to scores of thousands of the human race, who never knew what independent homes were before. Polygamy is here, to be sure. It was here when Brigham Young was appointed Governor of the Territory by an American President, although it was known that he had scores of wives, and that his example. and that of God's he had scores of wives, and that his example, and that of God's chosen people, in whose ancient midst the law was thundered, "Thou shalt not commit adultery," was equally known to be followed by thousands more. But it is now as I had the liberty, without offense, to predict to these good men many years ago. Rapid change has come with the free contact of this remarkable community.

Agitation has been going on since as a political and social force against polygamy until, denounced as a crime by the judicial tribunals of last resort, a situation exists whose gravity, so far as this people are concerned, is not over-estimated by anybody.
